## **Major Changes**

- Turkey began to renew some of its procurement programs, which were cancelled or
  postponed following the economic crisis of March 2001. Turkey's expectations for
  massive aid from the USA were frustrated, as relations between Turkey and the
  USA deteriorated following the 2003 Iraq war.
- The Turkish Land Forces did not renew their proposed requirement for new advanced MBT but signed a contract with Israel to upgrade 170 M60 MBT out of some 900 fit for this upgrade. The Land Forces are absorbing a second batch of 551 ACVs from the Turkish Industry. Another project that goes on is the project to renew the Turkish artillery with 300 Firtina 155mm self-propelled guns, and 400 Panther 155mm towed howitzers, all indigenously assembled. Another important acquisition is the Harpy anti radar drone received from Israel.
- The Air Force received almost all of its upgraded Phantom F-4 combat aircraft. The
  project is scheduled to end by mid 2003. Another upgrade project involves the aging
  F-5 which are being upgraded and will be used for training. The Air Force is
  absorbing its new command and control system, which includes 14 TRS-22XX
  radars from France.
- The Naval Aviation is absorbing 8 S-70 Seahawk helicopters. Further acquisitions of these helicopters are expected. The Navy and the Coast Guard received 6 of 9 CN-235 maritime patrol aircraft. Their mission specific systems will be installed separately.
- The Turkish Navy received the last of 6 used A-69 corvettes from France. These are
  acquired as gap fillers until the new Mil Gem corvettes will be supplied. The
  Turkish Navy also received its 7th Oliver Hazard Perry Frigate from the US Navy.
  Two more Oliver Hazard Perry frigates are to be supplied. The first of 4 Gur class
  submarines was launched.
- The Coast Guard received 5 of 10 proposed Seaguard patrol boats.
