Witnesses will say "It's changed my >life/the way I think" - another 'catch-22' for an investigator. That sounds similar to some near-death experiences which are also reported to be life-changing. This kind of reaction would be expected if the driving force behind the sighting were the witness's own consciousness. If the unknown object were created by the opening of a safety valve in an observer's own psyche, one might expect a profound shift in that person's outlook on life. It would be natural for such active involvement in the sighting to be followed by a strong emotional, even numinous, If a witness has experienced more than one sighting, it's possible that s/he is more than just a passive observer. Ok, please go and find a pro-Roswell book (post 1980) touting that nearly every witness used wood, balsa wood, splinters, and balsa wood colors in their descriptions. To ignore this and not do proper follow-up is not equalized research.

Also, miraculously, the dimensions of both Alien and Rawin target frames are identical in size, length, and color? These can't be ignored frivolously as you like to insist or for us to believe - by throwing our brains out to these self consistent and detracting facts? Instead, you'd have us use weak arguments in favor of us making nonsensical connections to alien content. Is there not the slightest hesitation - a counter view to your inflicted viewpoint?

Also, the wood beams were covered with tape, glue, and paper all reinforcing their bending stress limits. S. Cavitt used the term bamboo in his description which implied it's improved strength characteristics.

Marcel, said he was holding up the actual debris in the one photo and Newton's testimony stated that Marcel was insisting that it wasn't a Rawin target during the meeting - pointing to the colored designs along the beams. But, wait, that is unusual and Marcel was simply making an argument as to why he found the material inconsistent. But, was he entirely correct? (By the way, colorful wrapping tape was getting popular in the 1940's).

The amount of material recovered also did not make sense to Marcel (but, true, more than a single target hung from the Mogul balloon train) along with the black box, long strings, and metal loop mentioned in early accounts - But, it also made it inconsistent with it being entirely with what Newton believed since he didn't see the debris field and the totality of materials. They obviously removed portions from the Ramey floor collection (never arrived there?) and swapped out material as Dubose said.

Also, lighter aluminum foil was not well known at the time - only tinfoil: Large sheet Aluminum foil did not come out in the popular market until later in that year. And, why they resorted to the phrase tinfoil-like to get across these technologic differences: All told, enough to make something seem more advanced or out of place - a curiosity during the late June UFO craze absent the nonlinear view we have of the coming technology revolution and what really constitutes advanced materials.

So, they are both correct (including Dubose) since each could not have the privilege to know further details - and could not speak long term to actual situational facts and differences causing frustration for Marcel in particular.

So far, you haven't proven to me that you are an investigator - able to make reasonable and responsible connections between witness accounts. Well, I don't really blame you when your faced with the alternative of having to spank your friends.

In what I just wrote, I defend Marcel and there's no need to ridicule his mistake or logical insistences within the historical context. Neither is it necessary to ridicule Newton who did not see the entirety of what was collected by Marcel/Cavitt/Brazil: Marcel couldn't tell Newton anything further during that meeting and pointed to whatever was there, lingering in the selected material, that could relay what was, at least, different about it - the faded colorful tape imprints along the beams - at which point I'm sure it was promptly removed:)

When you can get all the witnesses and facts in reasonable alignment, as I just demonstrated, there is good reason to believe it's something well worth considering. Especially since I researched the case extensively and had the integrity and self control to change his early opinion, unlike the others, when faced with obvious problems and invidious hurdles.

I can't lie to you in order to tell of the greater truths worth considering outside this lamentable case.

There is no problem, Jim. The clouds you identify as alto-
cumulus are middle clouds generally in the range 6000 - 20,000 ft. They generally won't be ice clouds and also in general
because these are convective clouds in vertically unstable air
any ice crystals in them are not going to be orientated in
regimented strata so as to produce a subsun.
Subsuns are produced in thin layers of cirrus that form usually
above 26,000 and are always ice. The plane is probably at a cruise altitude of around 30,000ft. If the clouds of ice
platelets are in stable air they will tend to lie horizontally
below the aircraft and mirror the sun as described.
If you search specialised sites like atoptics.com you will find
images of subsuns looking exactly like this formed in exactly these conditions. The haze of cirrus crystals can be thin and itself virtually imperceptible.

I agree that the poverty of information is (typically)
```

appalling. I'd be much happier to be supplied with chapter and verse. As it is, viewing the video and looking at the shadows on

the cumulus tops indicates a direction of illumination from somewhere in front of the camera rather than behind. The presence of a phenomenon in the approximate direction of the sun and looking and behaving in every respect like a subsun seems to be reasonable evidence that the sun is indeed where it appears to be. This leads me to predict that if and when any more detailed information is forthcoming it will prove the subsun theory at nearer the p = 1.0 level. That's testable. What is your prediction?

Actually the clouds resemble lower-level alto-cumulus more than
cirro-cumulus. But in case you're right, around 30,000 ft, you'd still need to dig up some example of where the subsun's
intensity was very constant whether there was solid white cloud directly underneath/behind it, or just invisible ice crystals showing blue sky, in a case when the airplane traversed a combination of both. I've never heard of a steady subsun
```

existing under such a condition myself. I believe that this is a detail worth paying attention to rather than ignoring. (The atoptics.com website you referred to seems irrelevant.)

When you see a cloud layer like that, of an alto-cumulus or cirro-cumulus type, you know that (weak) updrafts formed and maintain the domes along with (weak) downdrafts between. Those downdraft areas are not conducive to the survival of any thin ice-crystal layer; they're clear and cloud-free because the cloud substance evaporated as the sinking air warmed. What you need is a cirro-stratus layer of nearly constant opacity. You can look up a 1998 paper in JAS on subsuns by J. I. Katz, for example: "From an airplane it is sometimes possible to see a nearly specular reflection of the sun from a flat layer of stratus clouds..." For a long-lasting subsun image, you need a stratiform cloud.

Granted other characteristics of that unidentified image looked like a subsun, but if a primary characteristic didn't, then the subsun explanation is out. We've both been exposed to lots of UFO sighting reports where the sighting resembled some known object or phenomenon, but wasn't, if the witnesses' details were correct; e.g., resembling an airplane, but making no sound and/or wrong navigational lights, or no tail, etc. So they're not IFOs. In the present case, one can't say the witness was wrong to find this out of the ordinary and worthy of sending to some UFO news service; the detail I've pointed out is there for all to see. Neverthess, if no witness comes forward, we can forget it.

Could you elaborate a little on your verdict?

It would be instructive to have your word on:

- 1. Why this explanation delivers an image that has a 'pacing' effect:
- i.e. appearing to move along with the aircraft, retaining its positional orientation vis-a-vis internal visual reference points.
- 2. In light of this pacing effect, why you rule out a reflection from an internal source.
- 3. The rationale for your assertion that the effect appears on the same azimuth as the sun: I'm assuming that you get to this from an analysis of shadows on clouds and the reflection on the inner rim of the front of the engine casing; I'd have said this data supports 'similar' azimuth, rather than 'same'. What I don't know is whether that distinction makes much difference to the verdict.
- 4. The likely reason for the fade-out of the image.
- 5. Whether the ice crystals in question are forming at an altitude that would be similar to that for those that deliver lunar halo phenomena sometimes visible from the ground (connected, in my mind at least, with the infrequency query, below)

My reason for asking you to these questions is straightforward. We have an image here that fits, superficially at least, a substantial number of verbal sighting reports from aircraft. I think quite a few list members would find it valuable to know more, if only to better calibrate their evaluation of and attitude to such reports.

Further to that point, I wonder just how common this phenomenon

is. In particular, whether its infrequency would be sufficient to mislead experienced aviators into attributing it to an entirely different type of cause.

Jim, please read my previous email again more carefully. Yes, the fluffy cloud tops visible below the plane are indeed probably altocumulus, so-called middle clouds, as you say at a much lower level than cirrus ice clouds. That is exactly what I said. I explicitly pointed out that these were *not* cirriform clouds.

To the extent that I can understand this, you appear to be saying that an intervening ice crystal layer at say 27,000 ft (a few k/ft below the aircraft) could not exist above a cumuliform cloud layer at say 10,000 ft (20,000 ft below the aircraft). I don't know on what grounds you would wish to assert such a thing, or why you think that if there were an ice crystal layer below the plane it would be seen against "blue sky".

I've never heard of a steady subsun >existing under such a condition myself. I believe that this is >a detail worth paying attention to rather than ignoring.

What conditions? What am I ignoring?

Atoptics.com is not at all irrelevant. It is a very useful site maintained by an acknowledged expert in atmospheric otpics (Les Cowley) which you would do well to study in order to understand what a subsun is. Or there a hundred others.

>When you see a cloud layer like that, of an alto-cumulus or >cirro-cumulus type, you know that (weak) updrafts formed and >maintain the domes along with (weak) downdrafts between. Those >downdraft areas are not conducive to the survival of any thin >ice-crystal layer; they're clear and cloud-free because the >cloud substance evaporated as the sinking air warmed.

Again, this is precisely what I told you, to correct _your_ previous assertion that the phenomenon could not be a subsun because the reflection would have fluctuated as the line of sight (LOS) tracked across those lumpy cumuliform cloudtops. Those clouds are irrelevant. The reflection is occurring from platelet ice crystals many thousand of feet above those clouds.

>What you need is a cirro-stratus layer of nearly constant >opacity.

No, incorrect. What you need is hexagonal plate-like ice crystals. The thickness of the layer or the "opacity" is irrelevant. The reflection geometry is the same for any ice crystal in the LOS no matter how far away from the eye it is and the image can be formed from crystals falling in a deep region of air at many disfferent distances from the eye (the layer or cloud is _optically_ thin, but can be metrically thick). As long as the number of crystals in the line of sight is roughly constant and as long as they continue to drift with the right average (horizontal) orientation then the reflected sun image will stay constant. When the LOS passes into a region of fewer crystals or of convectively disordered crystals then the image will fade away.

>You can look up a 1998 paper in JAS on subsuns by J. I. Katz, >for example: "From an airplane it is sometimes possible to see a >nearly specular reflection of the sun from a flat layer of >stratus clouds..." For a long-lasting subsun image, you need a >stratiform cloud.

You actually don't need perceptible cloud at all. You can often see right through a halo-forming region of ice crystals as though it wasn't there. This is more obvious when it happens at low altitude with clear landscape in the background. See e.g.

When the right type of ice crystals form at low level in extreme cold they're called "diamond dust", but they are the same as the cirrus crystals that usually form around -40C at high altitude (see for example

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

For the same reason that a rainbow "follows" your car. The image

by a changing set of raindrops / ice crystals. The fixed points

In light of this pacing effect, why would I rule out a subsun?
It looks just like a subsun. The conditions appear to be consistent with a subsun.
A subsun appears to the eye to be "out there" and objective, and would readily attract someone to film it as a UFO. It stays "out
there" in the same apparent position even if you move your head
```

around. But as you know, an image in a mirror appears to be the same distance behind the mirror as the source is in front of it.

An interior window reflection would be revealed as such by moving your head because of obvious parallax.

Then there is the question of what the source could be. Thinks about the angle the LOS makes with the surface of the window. As can be seen from the window frame, engine pods and lower cloud deck the LOS is looking somewhat forward and down with the camera not far fromn the glass. Knowing the basic geometry of incidence and reflection, and knowing airline seating, that tells you that the light source would have to be somewhere on the back of the seat immediately in front of the photographer. What could it be? And why wouldn't it be obvious to the photographer that such an unusual light in this position was the source of a reflection in the window?

Maybe you can argue that the photographer knew it was a window reflection but deliberately wanted to make a film of a "UFO". But really it's just much simpler to conclude that a light which has the shape, appearance and behaviour of a subsun, is a subsun.

>3. The rationale for your assertion that the effect appears on >the same azimuth as the sun: I'm assuming that you get to this >from an analysis of shadows on clouds and the reflection on the >inner rim of the front of the engine casing; I'd have said this >data supports 'similar' azimuth, rather than 'same'. What I >don't know is whether that distinction makes much difference to >the verdict.

Maybe I wasn't clear but "the effect appears on the same azimuth as the sun" refers to the effect called a subsun. Whether the image in question is exactly on the azimuth of the sun or not can't be determined, but judging from the cloud shadows the azimuth of sun and object seem likely to be "similar" (as you say) and could be identical. That is, the cloud shadows are not inconsistent with the subsun theory

>4. The likely reason for the fade-out of the image.

Either the plane moves beyond the region of ice crystals (most likely IMO) or the stable horizontal orientation of the crystals breaks down for some reason (less likely IMO because the subsun would then elongate further in a vertical direction just before disappearing - I don't detect that) or else the sunlight incident on the ice crystals is blocked by higher cloud (least likely, considering the altitude and visible conditions).

>5. Whether the ice crystals in question are forming at an >altitude that would be similar to that for those that deliver >lunar halo phenomena sometimes visible from the ground >(connected, in my mind at least, with the infrequency query, >below)

The crystals responsible can form at any altitude where it's cold enough. Up at cirrus altitudes it's around -40C, but they can form very much lower at around -20C, so even down to ground level in some conditions (ice fogs of diamond dusts). Different shaped crystals can also form that cause different halos. There is no physical difference between moon halos and sun halos, just a different light source.

>My reason for asking you to these questions is straightforward.

I hope my answers are, too.

>We have an image here that fits, superficially at least, a >substantial number of verbal sighting reports from aircraft. I >think quite a few list members would find it valuable to know >more, if only to better calibrate their evaluation of and >attitude to such reports.

>Further to that point, I wonder just how common this phenomenon >is. In particular, whether its infrequency would be sufficient >to mislead experienced aviators into attributing it to an >entirely different type of cause.

I don't know how to estimate the frequency of potential subsun sightings, but I shouldn't have thought they were rare given how often there will be clear sunny sky above planes routinely flying at ~30,000ft in conditions for cirrus crystals to form. I'm sure there have been cases where aircrews have reported

subsuns as unknowns, but I can't myself bring one to mind right now. Case 54 from the Condon Report was "inconclusively" identified as a subsun photographed from a plane at >20,000ft

There have been some variations in the official statements on Mogul.

One fact that everyone can check is that, in the big Roswell Report of 1995, the NYU complete report on the Mogul flights states that Mogul 5, launched on June 5,1947, was the first complete balloon train launched at White Sands.

Mogul 4 is not mentioned at all in that report, and Charles Moore was one of the authors!

In that same report, Mogul 2 and 3 are listed as failed attempts in Bethlehem, Penn, but the Air Force presentation mentions a launching of Mogul 3 at White Sands on May 29.

In his book of 1997, Charles Moore states clearly, on page 82, that the balloon ascension of May 29 did not have the recording instruments, which had not yet arrived, so it was not a Mogul flight.

The bottom line is that there was no Mogul 4 flight at all, and the story written by Moore in his book is an invention.

To EBK and the List,

The following suggestions regarding the time line of the Roswell event are based essentially upon the outstanding book of Tom Carey and Donald Schmitt Witness to Roswell. That book is a must read for anyone interested, especially the second edition with still new witnesses, published this year. However, I am not completely satisfied with their time line, and I have made some suggestions to modify it a bit, already in 2008. Before Monday July 7, 1947 : rumors of a crash

An important point, which appears so well in the book of Carey and Schmitt, is that, before the turning point of Tuesday, July 8, with the famous press release, a lot of people in the area and in the city of Roswell were already talking of the crash of a "flying saucer".

Among the neighbors of Brazel (see page 75 of the new edition): Proctor, Sultemeier, Strickland, Martin, Eppers, Pierce, Boswell, and McKnight. And also, people from the Richards ranch, just south of the Foster ranch (pages 50, 51).

Many had visited the debris field and picked some debris. Some had seen the bodies near the debris field (page 47): Timothy "Dee" Proctor, Sidney "Jack" Wright, two sons of rancher Thomas Edinton, and one daughter of Truman Pierce.

Some people were showing around pieces of debris, already at the rodeo in Capitan, on Friday 4.

Brazel had informed some people in Corona on Saturday: his uncle Hollis Wilson, customers at the Wade's bar, the general store, his friend, the police officer Robert Scroggins (who may have shown later a piece of memory metal to the firemen of Roswell). And his landowners, the Foster brothers in Texas, according to Geraldine Perkins: he did it from her store because she had he only telephone line!

There are also witnesses at the city of Roswell, and at the base, according to whom the rumor was running of a saucer crash. Therefore, it is quite probable that the officers of Roswell and their hierarchy became aware of that situation, and that it led them to issue the press release as a damage control operation, on Tuesday morning.

Let's see more closely how things may have happened on Monday 7 and Tuesday 8. I follow their book, but suggest a few changes.

Monday July 7, 1947

The two sites on the Foster ranch : debris field and body site

On Monday 7, Major Marcel and Captain Cavitt inspect the debris

field.

Since Brazel had already spoken to Franck Joyce on Sunday of the nearby body site (let's call it the third site), it seems very probable that he also led them to that site, although he son of Marcel does not believe it because his father never talked to him about it. But Marcel revealed later to other witnesses that he had seen alien bodies (Sgt Herschel Grice, and Sue Marcel Methane). The bodies at the third site were badly injured, and smelling.

Could the Roswell base send troops to take control of the third site already on Monday evening?

We know that Cavitt returned to the base earlier than Marcel, who remained on the debris field. There are reasons to suppose that it would have been decided then to go back urgently to the third site, to take back the bodies, even before taking control of the area of the Foster ranch. Brazel was not available then to lead them, having been brought back to Roswell by Walt Whitmore, but Cavitt could do it.

The second site, or impact site, closer to Roswell

The archeological team found the second site, with craft and bodies, probably on Monday morning.

According to Carey and Schmitt, they called the authorities in Roswell after walking some five miles to find a phone in the hamlet of Mesa, on the road 285. That took some time, evidently. We don't know at what time the police and military reached the site. It is plausible that it took them also a bit of time to find the place. So, it seems probable that this operation of taking control happened only in the afternoon, or early evening.

It seems that they decided not to bring back the bodies immediately, having soon gained control of the site, smaller than the debris field and closer to Roswell. They decided to install them in a tent for the night. Two witnesses, Ed Sain and Raymond Van Why, told their families that they had been posted to guard the tent for the night. Both said that they had seen the craft, so it had to be at the second site, closer to Roswell. This seems confirmed by the duration of travel to the site, less than an hour.

This decision not to bring back the bodies immediately may have been taken because of sanitary risk (already perceived as critical with the deteriorated bodies of the third site). The testimony of the photographer Benthal, brought the next morning, seems to confirm that (obliged to wear a protective suit, noticing a smell of formaldehyde in the tent, seeing a refrigerator truck.). On the other hand, the survivor would have been brought back to the base as soon as Monday evening, in an ambulance.

Tuesday, July 8

Briefing of Colonel Blanchard, at 7.30 am.

If General Ramey and Colonel DuBose were there, as revealed by Walter Haut, they probably had arrived on Monday evening, and they returned to Fort Worth as soon as Tuesday morning after the briefing, to prepare the press meeting with a weather balloon in the afternoon.

Marcel and Cavitt make their report. At this time, all must be worried by the risk of not being able to control rapidly enough the site at the Foster ranch, hence the decision to issue a rather vague press release in the morning, in order to be able to look good if they failed. At the briefing, that decision is made, evidently, in liaison with the Pentagon.

Toward the end of Tuesday morning, the military are able to cordon the whole area. The risk of leak in the public is considerably reduced, and it becomes possible to organize the balloon story at Fort Worth in the afternoon.

Bringing the craft and bodies to the base

The craft is brought back to the base during Tuesday, as told by several witnesses

The bodies of the second site, after the photographic session, are brought to the base during Tuesday, at the end of the morning, or early afternoon.

Eli Benjamin, a new important witness, was requested in the afternoon to go at the big hangar P3. Once there, he had to carry bodies to the hospital, where he saw medical and non medical officers already waiting for them. These were probably the bodies just brought from the second site.

At the hospital, Benjamin noticed a foul smell, a detail which seems to confirm that the smelly bodies of the third site were already there, for an autopsy. Carey and Schmitt also give the credible testimony of Miriam Andrea Bush who confirmed a medical examination. Her testimony, together with some others, seems to confirm the controversial testimony of Glenn Dennis

If this time line is correct, Montoya would have seen the bodies, in the hangar P3, sometime on Tuesday. Was it in the morning or in the afternoon? One question is: how could he enter the base, which was supposedly locked at that time? Perhaps because there was a lot of agitation during the whole day, and some lack of command, many officers being already out, at the sites, or on their way to Fort Worth.

According to still other witnesses, in the city of Roswell and on the base, the craft seems to have been brought in the afternoon, at the hangar P3. Montoya did not mention it, but Walter Haut said that Blanchard went with him to see it in the hangar, and also the bodies, presumably later in the afternoon. These testimonies seem compatible.

Transportation of the craft, the debris, the bodies and the survivor.

It seems that the smelly bodies, after an aborted autopsy at the hospital, were secured in a distant area, under a tent for the night of Tuesday to Wednesday, before being loaded in a crate in the B-29 "Straight Flush", on Wednesday.

There is some uncertainty remaining for the transportation of the bodies of the second site. According to the testimony of General Blanchard, they were sent first to Muroc (now Edwards AFB), and later to Wright field, in a plane piloted by Captain Henderson.

There is uncertainty as to the transportation of the living being, and of the remains of the craft.

According to Lt.col Magruder, they were carried to Wright field, since he told his sons that he had seen them there around mid-July (actually later according to the second edition). The transportation of the craft would have been made by road, presumably.

In short, the new testimonies seem to blend well together with the older ones, to make a credible story, and a strong case for the reality of a UFO crash near Roswell.

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

EWN member Exopolitics United Kingdom is a cosponsor of the Liverpool Beyond Knowledge Conference.

PRG's advocacy work has been covered extensively by US and foreign media.

On the tour Mr. Bassett hopes to gain a greater understanding of how Europeans view the UFO/ET issue and the disclosure process. He will brief informal and formal groups on the pending collapse of the truth embargo, possibly in 2009, work to bring new countries into the EWN and seek new support for the ongoing advocacy initiatives.



In reality, the case was investigated almost immediately after its occurrence by no less than Allan Hendry of CUFOS, who did a fine job and whom Magonians quote adoringly when he's saying what they want to hear. No evidence of a hoax emerged, and none has since.* To every available indication, short of the solution of the UFO mystery itself, we know everything relevant that there is to know.

It is worth noting that encounters with generally similar features occurred in the area in the same general time frame. (Johnson's encounter occurred in rural northwestern Minnesota.) One took place in southeastern South Dakota to the south two days later. None were so dramatic as Johnson's, but they did indicate the presence of the sort of UFO type and associated

John Harney ridicule them as conspiracy theorists.

activity (namely a brilliant light source barreling down a rural highway toward a moving automobile) that Johnson described. Or maybe Johnson and associates orchestrated those, too.

In the spirit of one who hurls mud at a wall, Klass advanced the argument that Johnson's case must be a hoax because nobody had ever reported anything like it. While researching The UFO Encyclopedia (see p. 611, second edition), I found a strikingly comparable incident, entirely overlooked by ufologists and everybody else, in an obscure small-town Minnesota paper from May 1961. Unfortunately, this one - unlike Johnson's - had no Allan Hendry to investigate it.

The damage to the car was extensive and has many peculiar features.. In particular the conclusion derived by Meridian French, a windshield expert from Ford, who examined the damage is most illuminating:

=E2=80=9CEven after several days of reflection on the crack patterns and apparent sequence of fractures, I still have no explanation for what seem to be inward and outward forces acting almost simultaneously. I can only [conclude]... that all cracks were from mechanical forces of unknown origin=E2=80=9D

Thus if John=E2=80=99s interpretation is correct, at least two individuals must have been involved in the =E2=80=9Cattack=E2=80=9D. One would have been required to enter the car and damage the windshield, whilst the other individual damaged the windshield from the outside (at the same time).

This seems highly unlikely and does not deserve further comment.

The damage to the antennas, the failure of the engine to charge and other aspects of the damage are also puzzling and are difficult to reconcile, with John's interpretation.

The physical injuries sustained by Val Johnson, particularly the =E2=80=9Cburning of the eyes=E2=80=9D are also inconsistent with an attack.=

Dr W.A Pinsonneault, who examined Val Johnson compared the eye damage to=E2=80=9Cmild welder burns=E2=80=9D.

If one suggests that a =E2=80=9Chigh powered beam=E2=80=9D was focused/concentrated upon Val Johnson by individuals unknown, then this scenario fails to explain the extensive damage to the car.

Finally (and one could go on) there is the issue of Val Johnson's watch and the car clock, both of which were 14 minutes slow (I suppose the individuals who =E2=80=9Cattacked=E2=80=9D Val Johnson=

could have re-wound his watch and re-set the clock!). It is important to note that Val Johnson checked the time with dispatch at 7pm (as he always did).

I have absolutely no idea of what Val Johnson encountered. The evidence, however does not support John's intereperation.

I find the Val Johnson case fascinating because of its
similarity to another case discussed on the List last fall. The
subject heading then was Selective Damage To Car Drives UFO
Theorists.
If you recall, a woman's car was "bumped" on the driver's side,
and the cause was hard to determine from the nature of the
damage.
To quote the article:
"Most of the driver's side of the 2008 Mitubishi sedan is caved
in, but there's hardly a scratch in the paint. The side mirror
hangs from its cables.
... There's a deep dent in the pillar separating the windshield
```

from the door frame, and it seems to fit the shape of the mirror. But the mirror is plastic, and the pillar is thick steel. That's like dropping an egg in a skillet and seeing the egg dent the pan."

I commented then that plastic denting steel might be possible if the impact was accompanied by a field that reduced the binding force in the steel so that it was malleable at the time of the impact.

Wilbert Smith was told back in the 1950s by "the boys upstairs" that a reduction in binding force was responsible for the destruction of aircraft that got too close to alien saucer craft. The same kind of effect might now be present in other current technologies, black or otherwise.

Some of the mystery about the physical evidence in the Val Johnson case is removed if we accept that some kind of pressure wave hit the car which was accompanied by a field that softened metal.

- 1) The bridegework in his mouth was broken at the gums, although it was otherwise intact. There was no pain or swelling in his mouth. This is no surprise if the metal softened but fractured only at the stress points.
- 2) Spring loaded radio antennae were bent well away from the anchor point on the car. Insects were still attached, suggesting that the bending force was not that great. Again, if the softening of the antenna metal were localized where the bend occurred, the accompanying pressure wave would bend it like one of Uri Geller's spoons.
- 3) The car clock and driver's watch were both 14 minutes slow after the impact. According to the information Wilbert Smith received, the region of reduced molecular binding force around the saucer is associated with a modified tempic field gradient, which is associated with the rate of time flow. This is in accord with the observed change in Johnson's clock time.

So there is a degree of consistency among these kinds of cases given the right hypothesis, and this consistency, in turn, supports the hypothesis.

Whycliffe Wells revisited, huh?

You hear so many mixed accounts about UFO sightings that I feel it is incumbent on us to go out there and talk to the actual witnesses, talk to others in the vicinity - especially sceptics - and read what media accounts there are about the phenomenon.

So when there was a flurry of sightings reported at WW in 1995 I went with my sons out to the place to see what was really going on. I never found out.

True, I had a bizarre telepathic experience on the way out there, having never had voices in my head in my adult life. A thundering voice while I was driving at night told me in garbled speak they were friendly and that they had gifts for me. I did not stop, except shortly afterwards to jot down what I heard and tell my sons who had been asleep. There was a joint USA-Oz military exercise going on in the Northern Territory at the time and I later learned the US military did have something they called Voice-of-God technology. Certainly something exterior to my skull communicated to me. If something like that spoke into Abraham and Moses' heads I can understand why they were converted to Judaism. The phenomenon certainly exploited material already there in the brain and that is all I will now material already there in the brain, and that is all I will now say on that subject.

And I found at Tennant Creek library plenty of newspaper reports by people of sometimes very scary encounters with hovering disc-shaped craft. Later in the UFO literature there were further reports of similar events in other states in Australia. One striking case was near Maitland, N.S.W. where a craft was observed beaming radiation into the salt water below and sucking up the steam, a great way to collect pure water it would seem.

At WW itself in mid-1995 I did speak to proprieter Lou Farkas and he gave me descriptions of repeat visits by UFOs to his glorified caravan park, but he had no photos to show me. I found no guests there that had seen anything, and I hung around about a week and saw nothing, One staff member told me he had seen a hovering object but he was not especially credible. Meanwhile several very relieable staff members told me no UFOs had been seen at all!

What I did find of interest was that Lou Farkas' Chinese wife had set up a shrine in the shop with a giant toy ape at its centre. But nobody was forthcoming about that was about. It was not easy living out there with flies that insisted on injecting eggs into our tear ducts (maggots eventually drop down into your throat) and the constant threat of running out of water in a region with an incredibly low population density.

Most tourists out there hurtle through in posh cars and stop at tourist parks like WW in air-conditioned comfort and they were hardly likely to see anything. What we did was go and camp in the scattered bush across the road from WW where the aborigines came and went. They were friendly and did not bother us. Several were alarmed that I had a young blond son there and warned that he was likely to be abducted by little men who live in the trees and the rocks and who would teach him strange skills.

Perhaps most damning of all was that the aborigines I met had seen no UFOs, but they did tell me they knew about them, and that they came around to fetch water.

Then one day I met one of them again who excitedly told me he had seen one! It was going slow and had a flashing green light, he told me. Then one morning not far north of WW my sons and I saw a craft slow and silent as a dirigible go right overhead. But I later identified that as a YF-22 advanced tactical fighter, perhaps on the last leg of a suborbital flight from continental USA - dare I say from Area 51. Fuckin impressive technology!!!

I did eventually work out where the fair dinkum UFOs were emanating from, and I think Lou Farkas was being at least partly truthful, though I was left suspecting that he was promoting the UFO thing for the benefit of his own business.

If the pattern runs true then over the next year or so there will be many more reports of UFO activity with craft following motor vehicles and hovering over water.

Take Me To Your Gizmos: MoD In Bid For Alien Tech Jack Grimston

The Ministry of Defence ordered an investigation of thousands of UFO sightings in the 1990s to examine whether alien spaceship technology could be exploited to build advanced engines for the RAF, according to a new official history.

The book, based on the ministry's 'X-files' of thousands of sightings, shows that an unnamed wing commander initiated the project in 1993 because he believed it was wrong to assume extra-terrestrial craft did not exist.

Nick Pope, who has written on UFOs and was a colleague of the officer at the MoD, confirmed the book's account: "I remember him saying he believed there was evidence of an exotic propulsion system and the bottom line was that if they had it, we sure as hell wanted it." Pope would not disclose the man's name.

Official documents from the wing commander are quoted in the book, written by David Clarke, senior journalism lecturer at Sheffield Hallam University.

The officer wrote that while most of the phenomena would have rational explanations, "if the sightings are of devices not of this earth then their purpose needs to be established as a matter of priority".

He added: "There has been no apparently hostile intent and other possibilities are 1) military reconnaissance; 2) scientific; and 3) tourism."

Alien engines, if they existed, were apparently "stealthy" and "do not use conventional reaction propulsion systems". The wing commander wanted to explore possibilities for "technology transfer".

The new book, The UFO Files: The Inside Story of Real-Life Sightings, is published by the National Archives in Kew, west London, and is based largely on MoD files released there. It traces the story of UFO sightings in Britain from the first decade of the 20th century.

Through much of the past 100 years, thousands of sightings by people ranging from RAF pilots to police officers and children have been collated by the MoD who believed they could yield evidence of advanced foreign aircraft of which Britain had no knowledge.

Some remain hard to explain, such as foo fighters, the name given to balls of fire that seemed to pursue RAF bombers in the second world war.

It was only in the 1990s, partly at the wing commander's prompting, that the MoD finally did a systematic analysis of UFO sightings, called Project Condign.

Most were explained by everyday objects, such as airships, clouds or even chinese lanterns, being mistakenly identified as alien craft, or by unusual atmospheric phenomena. No evidence of aliens was found.

A retired senior official at the defence intelligence staff, where the wing commander was employed, said: "Some people had bees under their bonnet... whenever UFOs were raised at the weekly directorate meetings it was in a fairly light-hearted and dismissive way."

Clarke's book shows sightings are still frequent. In 2007 the MoD opened a file on an incident over the sea near Guernsey in which pilots of two planes saw a "sparkling yellow object shaped like a long, thin cigar".

Last year the MoD's directorate of air staff logged 285 UFO sightings. The ministry runs a UFO hotline at RAF High Wycombe in Buckinghamshire which the public can telephone with details of sightings. The number is 01494 496 254.

Britain's X Files: RAF suspected aliens of "tourist" visits to Earth

A new book reveals details about UFO sightings over British skies after author David Clarke studied declassified Ministry of Defence records.

The book gives new insights into an incident known as "Britain's Roswell" as well as the belief in UFOs by high ranking defence officials.

Project Condign

Documents in the files reveal that there were high level defence officials in the 1990s who believed UFOs could be spacecraft piloted by extraterrestrials who could even be conducting "tourist" visits to earth.

In 1993, an RAF Wing Commander lobbied MoD officials about the need for a properly funded study.

He added: "If the sightings are of devices not of earth then their purpose needs to be established as a matter of priority. There has been no apparently hostile intent and other possibilities are: (1) military reconnaissance, (2) scientific, (3) tourism."

The Wing Commander, whose name is blanked out in the documents, said the MoD could learn from the craft.

"If the reports are taken at face value then devices exist that do not use conventional reaction propulsion systems, they have a very wide range of speeds and are stealthy. I suggest we could use the technology, if it exists."

The internal debate in the MoD came to a head in 1995, when documents were made public revealing that UFO reports were routinely copied to specialist "Defence Intelligence" branches.

An exasperated intelligence office wrote to the UFO Desk: "I see no reason for continuing to deny that (Defence Intelligence) has an interest in UFOs.

"However, if the association is formally made public, then the MoD will no doubt be pressurised to state what the intelligence role/interest is.

"This could lead to disbelief and embarrassment since few people are likely to believe the truth that lack of funds and higher priorities have prevented any study of the thousands of reports received."

Dr Clarke said: "Some of these officials, like the Wing Commander, obviously believed in some pretty weird stuff. He doesn't seem to have any evidence for his theories, but seems to have just been watching the X Files, like everyone else at the time.

"These are senior officials and yet they believe some pretty bizarre things."

An inquiry, Project Condign, was eventually launched in 1996, apparently without the knowledge of then defence secretary Michael Portillo. It was completed in 2000 under Geoff Hoon.

The report found: "That (UFOs) exist is indisputable. Credited with the ability to hover, land, take-off, accelerate to exceptional velocities and vanish, they can reportedly alter their direction of flight suddenly and clearly can exhibit aerodynamic characteristics well beyond those of any known aircraft of missile -- either manned or unmanned."

It went on that, although they existed, UFOs presented no threat to defence.

It found that many sightings of UFOs were in fact "plasmas" of gas caused by charges of electricity in the atmosphere.

The author even suggested that exposure to plasmas could cause responses in parts of the brain that lead to elaborate hallucinations that might be interpreted as supernatural experiences of encounters with aliens.

The inquiry examined seven "near misses" involving RAF aircraft and "unexplained aerial phenomenon".

The unnamed author concluded that "the possibility exists that a fatal accident might have occurred in the past" as a result of aircrew avoiding a UFO.

The study recommended that pilots should make "no attempt. to out manoeuvre a UAP during interception".

"Britain's Roswell"

This occurred in the early hours of December 26, 1980, in Rendlesham Forest, Suffolk, near two military bases used by the US Air Force: RAF Woodbridge and RAF Bentwaters.

US security personnel from the bases ventured into the forest after they spotted unusual lights that they feared could be a crashed aircraft. They reported seeing a strange glowing object which moved off through the forest.

Dr Clarke said the files from the National Archives, at Kew, showed the authorities had missed the opportunity to fully investigate the incident.

"There was clearly a missed opportunity to investigate properly here," he added.

Earlier this month, Peter Turtill, 66, from Ipswich, claimed that he had caused the scare by burning a lorry full of fertiliser.

However, his claim has been met with scorn by some ufologists.

Dr Clarke added: "There have been other people claiming responsibility for whatever happened in Rendlesham Forest. There is so much ambiguity about the incident and that is because there was not enough done at the time to look into it."

The article at the above URL is my first exposure to the evidence. It strikes me that a pretty strong case has been made already, even without further DNA analysis, that there is something non-human about the skull. In particular, the fibers inside the bone, the unusual hardness of the bone, and the highly unusual but symmetric shape of the eye sockets do it for me.

I recall from my basic biology education that phenotype is affected by environment. However, someone would need to explain what environmental conditions would cause strong fibers to be added to the bone structure, as well as the unusual placement of the openings for the optic nerve in both eyes. As Mr. Pye says, these must be due to genotype. Further DNA analysis would, of course, test this hypothesis, but the results are likely to be somewhat anti-climactic.

Controversy seems unnecessary at this point. As both Katharina and Mr. Pye have said, we need but wait.

Argentina: A UFO Close Encounter in San Juan

The woman was sharing a moment of rest and conversation with a friend in a stand of pine trees in the province of San Juan. A strong wind had left in its wake a peaceful evening with clear skies. Both protagonists chatted beside a car when suddenly, a light having an estimated 5 meters in diameter lit up over their heads. When they looked up, the saw a floating object that appeared to "study" them for 10 seconds before taking off. Three Spacecraft Find Water On The Moon.

Three spacecraft have indications of widespread water on the moon. Media coverage focused on the surprise of scientists regarding this result and how it has potential implications for future human exploration. ABC World News (9/23, story 10, 1:45, Gibson) reported, "It appears there is much more water on the surface of the moon than anyone ever knew." ABC (Ned Potter) added, "Today's discovery is something that NASA has been hoping for, for years." Carl Pilcher, NASA: "Water that might be used someday by...human lunar explorers, who return to the moon to do science on the moon and perhaps it is a steppingstone out into the rest of the solar system." Potter: "Several satellites orbiting the moon have found tell tale readings of ice in the lunar soil, billions of gallons of it. There had been hints of this in the 1990s, but now, three papers in the journal 'Science' say there is good proof. ... In just a few weeks, there may be even better proof. NASA plans to crash a rocket called LCROSS into the moon, and a satellite will measure precisely what it kicks up."

The AP (9/24, Borenstein) reports the water "was spotted by spacecraft that either circled the moon or flew by. All three ships used the same type of instrument that looked at the absorption of a specific wavelength of light that is the chemical signature of only two molecules: water and hydroxyl," but scientists "doubted the unexpected measurement until it was confirmed independently and repeatedly." Measurements first seen aboard India's Chandrayaan-1 sent scientists looking at the data from NASA's Deep Impact and Cassini spacecraft for confirmation because they thought the measurements were wrong. "The chance that three different instruments malfunctioned in the same way on three different spaceships is almost zilch, so this confirms that it's water and hydroxyl," Brown University's Carle "Pieters said." However, "if you want a drink of water, it would take a baseball diamond's worth of dirt, said...Pieters." The AP notes that other scientists not involved with the work also called the findings "unequivocal."

Lawrence Taylor of the University of Tennessee, Knoxville, speaking in the New York Times (9/24, A29, Chang), said, "It's so startling because it's so pervasive." Widespread water "could make future settlement of the Moon easier, especially if significant water could be extracted just by heating the soil." Samples from the Apollo mission "did show signs of water, but

most scientists working with the samples, including Dr. Taylor, dismissed the readings," but now he is "convinced he was wrong." The data "suggests the water is being created when protons from the solar wind slam into the lunar surface. The collisions may free oxygen atoms in the minerals and allow them to recombine with protons and electrons to form water."

The Los Angeles Times (9/24, Johnson) notes that Roger Clark of the US Geological Survey, author of one of the papers, said "the discovery 'will forever change how we look at the moon.'" According to the article, "At the very least, the discovery lends weight to a new view of a friendlier solar system, where water...suddenly seems to be everywhere." However, it is "unclear how this discovery will affect the debate in Washington over NASA's future, but the presence of water on the moon would presumably make colonization much easier."

Space.com (9/24, Thompson) reports, "The various study researchers also suggest that the daily dehydration and rehydration of the trace water across the surface could lead to the migration of hydroxyl and hydrogen towards the poles where it can accumulate in the cold traps of the permanently shadowed regions."

In February 1953, Lytle - by then a weapons stockpiling supervisor with the Atomic Energy Commission (AEC) - was visiting Eielson Air Force Base, Alaska, together with newly-promoted USAF Brigadier General Blanchard, whose assignment was the training of aircrews for the B-36 strategic bombers based there.

Lytle, whose AEC office at Wright-Patterson AFB, in the early 1950s, put him in the right place at the right time to learn more, said that he had also been privy to "leaks about autopsies on the bodies from people who had been in and seen them." Lytle further stated that the crashed craft had been stored at Hanger 5 on the base, adding, "I had the highest clearances involving atomic weapons stockpiling. I was very heavily cleared to do what I did, but I was never allowed into that area."

Hastings says, "Three years after my 1998 interview with Lytle,

he refused to answer a few follow-up questions, nervously telling me that after our first conversation he had been 'paid a visit' by someone who wanted to know why he was talking to me and Roswell researcher Don Schmitt."

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

Hi Everyone,

In addition to the Earth, there are many other bodies in our Solar System that are known or suspected of having large quantities of water ice on or just below their surfaces. These bodies include other "moons" such as Jupiter's Europa (a world compariable in size to our Moon) and Saturn's Enceladus (only 500 kilometers in diameter) that also have very thin or no atmospheres.

The news that ice water ice was discovered on the Moon did not come as a surprise to York's space scientists who confirmed with their experiments on the Phoenix Mars lander that there is lots of water ice on and just below the surface of Mars and even observed water ice clouds and falling snow.

If we could do this back in the late 1960s, we can use a similar claw to retrieve water ice from inside this dark lunar crater and convince those few scientists who want to see before they can believe that there is indeed water on the Moon.

If global warming on Earth is real, I would not be surprised if sometime in the near future Winter Olympics events such as ice hockey and downhill skiing are held on the slopes and surface of this water ice filled lunar crater which has the potential of sustaining a large human settlement - another Whistler, B.C.?

This is to inform that Brazilian Government has just declassified a new set of previously secret UFO documents, covering the 80s. We already had disclosures covering the 50s, 60s and 70s. So far over 4,000 pages have been disclosed.

The recent disclosure is very powerful because it contains dozens of reports of UFOs on May 19, 1986, considered the 'Official UFO Night in Brazil', when 21 spherical objects, estimated 100 meters in diameter - according to military sources - literally jammed air traffic over the major Braziian Airports, when several Mirage and F5 jets were scrambled to pursue them. In late July, hundreds of papers from the Brazilian Air Force's official System for the Investigation of Unidentified Aerial Phenomenon (SIOANI) have demonstrated how the nation's military authorities dealt with the UFO Phenomena in the 60s and 70s.

Considering that SIOANI wasn't a top secret agency and that even civilian researchers took part in its procedures, the structure and functionality of which proves that Brazil is the first country in the world to officially and publicly admit the reality of the UFO Phenomena, and the first to investigate it openly.

The Brazilian UFO Magazine website - www.ufo.com.br - already has thousands of pages for download, such as over 1,200 pages of documents, 200 photos of SIOANI's activities and Operation Saucer, carried out in the Amazonian region in 1977. Along with documents received by the Committee from other military sources.

I have sent the following to The UFO Iconoclast, in response to Anthony Bragalia's ludicrous claim that the Socorro CE III case was engineered by anonymous college students. I doubt it will get posted, or at least it hasn't as yet.:

The claims made in The Socorro UFO Hoax Exposed! - Famous 1964 Sighting Was A College Prank -) by Anthony Bragalia would be unacceptable as evidence in any court of law. His article contains only hear-say, and no evidence of what is alleged to have happened has been brought forth.

Any reader with the ability to hear can have the chance to learn the facts on Friday, October 2, at 1:30 to 3:30 PM, eastern USA time. That's because I have kindly been invited to address this matter on The Paracast at that time.

Bragalia's claim that the Socorro CE III case has been exposed should never have been published as being fact.

Please note: I wrote the book on the Socorro case, and that's a literal statement -- all 211 pages of it.

On Wednesday, April 29, 1964, I was the only investigator invited by Dr. J. Allen Hynek to be with him, Lonnie Zamora, and New Mexico State Police Sergeant Samuel Chavez (No one else was allowed there.) while we went over the entire experience.

Zamora didn't like to give many details to 'outsiders', but this time was different since he felt it his patriotic duty because Hynek was the official investigator for the U.S. Air Force.

Lonnie even sat in the police car parked exactly where it had been during the close-range part of the event, and went through the entire bodily action of quickly exiting the police car, stepping fast with his prescription glasses and sunshades on, directly toward the object. Then, as he did again for us, at only about thirty-five feet from where the 18-to-20 foot ellipsoidal object had rested, Zamora threw himself into a protective prone position on the slope, because a sudden and terribly loud roar began as a blue column of brilliant light emitted from the object. It was a diverging cone of light, being narrow at the top, but wider toward the ground.

Even at ~ 35 feet away, Zamora could feel heat radiating from the luminous 'exhaust'. Something has to be extremely hot to be felt at that distance, especially with a stiff breeze blowing it in another direction.

Subsequently, Allen Hynek commended my 1976, 211-page book about the case in a letter to me, intended for use in promoting it. An electronic copy of Hynek's letter is available from me, at anyone's individual request. He also donated a copy of my Socorro book to the technical library of NASA's Lyndon B. Johnson Space Center. (I have proof of that.)

My position regarding the Socorro object: It was an 18-to-20 foot ellipsoid of high eccentricity (i.e., long, rather narrow).

It displayed two distinct propulsion modes. One was used only in landing and take-off and was very noisy. The other and apparently primary propulsion mode was, by contrast, very quiet, but it imparted very high speed (both horizontally and in almost vertical flight) to the object in very few seconds of time.

The source of the object is unknown. Although it was technologically sophisticated, that does not certify an extraterrestrial origin, although associated evidences might, and not unreasonably, be taken as evidence of such.

Publicly unknown but extremely well-documented evidence relevant to the question of exotic propulsion of the Socorro object was recovered from the Socorro landing site and is in my possession. Its nature and possible significance will be discussed on The Paracast, October 2.

I am also preparing an in-depth, written expos=E9 of Bragalia's claims about the Socorro case. It will be published on any willing website when ready, because I don't personally have time to maintain one. Hopefully even Bragalia may be willing to carry it, once he learns the facts.

In short I am both encouraged and disappointed. Encouraged because he replied at all and had conceded to watch a TV documentary he'd been sent on Starchild.

I am disappointed because I don't consider he's given the research a fair whack - and now says he's not interested in pursuing the matter further, which must mean he won't examine the skull.

After my initial enquiry the Professor wrote :

"Dave, I have had a few enquiries about this previously (e,g, see edited emails below) and saw a recent TV documentary about it, which included DNA testing, with unremarkable results. Sorry to say that I have no interest in pursuing this topic, Best, Chris"

He included a couple of edited emails - one an enquiry like mine which presumably included the video of the documentary and concluded; "My question is this - after watching the video do you consider the skull to be an obvious/probable deformity or of more scientific significance? I look forward to hearing from you!"

Professor Stringer included his email reply to this enquirer which said: "Presumably you have looked at the Wikipedia entry for this - it's quite helpful? DNA work has apparently already been done, with unsurprising results, and more would not cost anything like as much as =A3250,000. As for this statement 'The results uncovered by Pye's team ruled out all known deformities' I'm afraid I'm with the sceptics on this one - there are various pathologies that will deform a skull like this. I have answered some previous enquiries on the skull, but don't have my emails at home - however, I did pursue the quoted work at Royal Holloway (where I am a Visiting Professor) of unusual bone structure, and was unable to recover any useful or scientifically verifiable information about this work, or to contact the person concerned, who had left several years earlier..Best Chris"

I wrote back to the Professor addressing several issues, including why he considered the DNA results 'unremarkable', and why he let drop the Royal Holloway enquiry about the unusual bone structure, simply because he was unable to speak to the person who did the research.

With his final reply to me he sent impressive photos of deformed skulls - one looking very similar to Starchild - and these words: "The mtDNA showed this was a normal native American human - or at least the mother was, which seems a good starting point to me. And I don't see anything really special in the pathological skull shape - have a look at these examples below. And the man at the Royal Holloway had left and none of the results were filed there, or published in a peer review journal, as far as I could ascertain. I have no wish to be involved with this, thank you, Best Chris"

So there we have it Dave. I was wrong in saying that an academic of his standing wouldn't even look at the Starchild issue. But I think I might have been right in that he didn't perhaps pursue it with the vigour one might like, to nail whether or not there is any real substance to Pye's claims.

He seems to have agreed for instance that the bone structure is unusual but because he couldn't speak to the person who studied it - decided to drop the matter.

Which I guess leaves it back in Lloyd Pye's lap to prove his case but to make sure that the scientists he uses are accepted experts and the issue is written up in peer reviewed journals.

Personally I am not holding my breath... but wish him well.

Mr. Stanford, when I was investigating the Barney Barnett UFO Incident, I had interviewed many witnesses in the Plains of St. Agustin and Socorro area. Since there were two famous cases overlapping in the same general area, I naturally made record of

I happened to interviewed a BLM worker who told me that he heard the call made by Zamora on the radio and got to the area soon ${\sf S}$ afterwards. He said he smelled something like kerosene burning! Have you heard any similar comments from others? Could one of the desert plants produce a similar odor when burning and have you or others checked out that possibility?

About twelve years ago a claim was made that the sighting was the inadvertent landing and take-off of a hot air balloon which seems to fit the witness account above, who'd smelled a strong odor of burning kerosene.

Having been around such balloons, they are extremely loud and considerably frightening if you encounter one for the first time dropping down from the sky. Their burners produce heat that can be felt for a considerable distance (60 feet and more)! In any event, how fast was the wind blowing that day and in which direction? And, in which direction did Zamora say that the object departed? Is it possible that these two directions agreed? In addition, would that place him downwind of the object too?

Has Zamora ever been re-interviewed concerning this possibility? Since such Balloons are probably more common these days, has he, himself, ever seen one since? If not, it might be an interesting proposal to expose him to one up close to get his impressions.

When the hot air balloon hypothesis was being considered, I naturally took more interest in it since it was not too long beforehand that I had interviewed this witness - that, along with my own personal experience with such balloons had naturally peeked my interest.

Perhaps you can address these issues in your upcoming report. If such pranksters can produce evidence of a prank as sophisticated as a hot air balloon, there may be some room for discussion(?). But, it's very doubtful. Otherwise, I would have to agree with you that their claims are rather flimsy, mere hearsay, and do not fit the facts, so far, obtained.

The hot air balloon burner generates a level of noise between that of a freight train (88 decibels) and a circular saw (107 decibels).

The threshold for human noise-induced pain is about 130dB.

>About twelve years ago a claim was made that the sighting was >the inadvertent landing and take-off of a hot air balloon which >seems to fit the witness account above, who'd smelled a strong >odor of burning kerosene.

>Having been around such balloons, they are extremely loud and >considerably frightening if you encounter one for the first time >dropping down from the sky. Their burners produce heat that can >be felt for a considerable distance (60 feet and more)! In any >event, how fast was the wind blowing that day and in which >direction?

>And, in which direction did Zamora say that the >object departed? Is it possible that these two directions >agreed? In addition, would that place him downwind of the >object too?

Several different balloon theories have been proposed for Socorro. All turn out to be preposterous if not impossible when the physics and details of the case are analyzed, as they have been here on Updates in years past.

Balloons are passive devices. They are carried in the direction of and no faster than the prevailing wind. The wind was determined to be out of the south and it was a very breezy day. As I remember, wind gusts were up 25 or 30 mph.

The Socorro object departed to the west-southwest, that is bucking the wind. This is quite impossible for a balloon.

The Socorro object also departed at a speed far greater than the prevailing wind. In fact, it may very well have been supersonic. The calculations are very simple, Physics 1 stuff. Zamora said the object faded in the distance at about 6 miles (using known landmarks). He estimated the time from when it went silent, flew horizontally towards the mountains in the west, then went into a steep climb before fading was about 10 seconds. (Incidentally, he had retrieved his glasses and had them on while watching the object's departure and disappearance in the distance.) Ray Stanford thought 20 seconds was probably more accurate when he reconstructed the timeline after interviewing Zamora.

Let's start with these numbers. 6 miles in 20 seconds is 18 miles a minute or 1080 miles/hr _average_ speed! However,

assuming constant acceleration, the peak speed at disappearance would be twice this or 2160 miles/hr! Not even a VTOL Harrier jet (which didn't even exist until 1966) can pull that off.

Now let's use more conservative numbers. Triple the disappearance time to 60 seconds or 1 minute. I did experiments with a target of the angular size of the Socorro object and tried to take contrast and sun glare into account. If it was a hazy day that reduced contrast and Zamora had some sun glare in his eyes (but had typical corrected normal acuity--remember, he had his glasses on again at this point), then maybe the fadeout distance was as low as 2.5 miles. (On the other hand, I found it could be as high as 8 miles, but we are trying to give the balloon theory every chance it can get by using the most conservative numbers.)

Now we have the object traveling 2.5 miles to fadeout in 1 minute for an _average_ speed of 150 mph, but, with constant acceleration, a peak speed of 300 mph. Again, even with these extremely conservative assumptions, the object departed at much too high a speed to be a balloon, even ignoring the fact that it would be flying into the wind. These high speeds also conclusively rule out other things as well, such as helicopters or small planes, even if we ignore another fact that Zamora reported that the departure was completely silent (a highly important detail that has nothing to do with his glasses or eyesight, unless his ears also fell off).

There are other horrific problems with any balloon theory, also previously discussed. E.g., nobody who brings up balloon theories ever discusses just how difficult it is to handle a balloon in the wind. E.g., how easily could hoaxers control even a relatively small balloon of the Socorro size in even a relatively low wind of 10 mph (4.5 m/sec)? Balloons are like sails and wind exerts a lot of force on them, that goes up as the square of the wind speed.

Wind pressure is given approximately by Pressure = 1/2 * air density * (wind speed)^2 * shape factor (drag).

Air density at sea level is about 1.2 kg/m^3. Assume the shape factor is simply 1 for the ellipsoidal object. This works out to a pressure of about 12 Newton/m^2 or .25 pounds/ft^2 .

Let's assume the Socorro egg-shaped object had a modest average cross-sectional area of 100 ft^2. Then total wind force on the balloon at 10 mph is only 25 pounds, which is very manageable. But what if the wind gusts up to 20 mph or 30 mph? Then we have a force of 100 pounds or 225 pounds. This is no longer so easy to manage. Several people would be needed to wrangle the balloon with cables to keep the balloon in place or to keep themselves from being dragged away. Why weren't they seen and how did they so quickly disappear without leaving a trace?

The alternative would be to have the balloon anchored in place with cables. But where did the anchors magically go, again leaving no trace? And why didn't Zamora report the balloon bobbing around in the wind, whatever the scenario, as balloons will inevitably do?

The hoaxers would also have to simulate a landing and a takeoff, by reeling in their control cables and then letting them out again, all while remaining completely invisible. What did they use? Harry Potter invisibility cloaks?

>Has Zamora ever been re-interviewed concerning this possibility? >Since such Balloons are probably more common these days, has he, >himself, ever seen one since? If not, it might be an interesting >proposal to expose him to one up close to get his impressions.

>When the hot air balloon hypothesis was being considered, I >naturally took more interest in it since it was not too long >beforehand that I had interviewed this witness - that, along >with my own personal experience with such balloons had naturally >peeked my interest.

You can't get around these problems using a hot-air balloon with some control over takeoff and landing. Somebody still has to control the heating device to make it descend and take off again. Why were they invisible? (As Ray Stanford reports, Zamora probably got closer than 50 feet to the object, maybe 35 feet,

and yes, he still had his glasses on at this point, not that it matters much.) And you still have to keep the balloon from bobbing around and being blown about while it is on the ground, again requiring some sort of cabling with wranglers and/or anchors.

If some guy was suspended from the balloon to control its descent and ascent (again all done invisibly), you run into further restrictions of physics. People have weight, and balloons have to have minimum sizes to support such weight. You can't get around this. Minimum volumes of air have to be displaced to create the necessary buoyancy (Archimede's principle). I did a calculation here on Updates some years back to demonstrate that even with midgets, unreasonably light rigging, and weightless balloon envelopes, you still need a hot air balloon at least 45 ft in diameter to create the necessary buoyancy. Real hot air balloons are much larger than this (and they never fly in winds over 15 mph, unless one has a death wish).

The Socorro device was SUV size, not the size of a 5 story apartment building. No balloon this size can lift a human being, even a very small one. There is no possible way that Zamora could get that close and confuse objects that disparate in size, even with his glasses off, which they weren't.

And even if one could figure out exactly how to make a balloon land, take off, and remain stationary on the ground in a gusty wind, all in a controlled way, and do this invisibily leaving no trace of one's presence during the sighting or afterward, how does a balloon fly against the wind at hundreds and perhaps even thousands of miles per hour?

Anybody who waves their hands and claims balloon explanations for Socorro are some sort of viable theory, just doesn't understand the first thing about the case or the physics of the situation.

>Perhaps you can address these issues in your upcoming report. If >such pranksters can produce evidence of a prank as sophisticated >as a hot air balloon, there may be some room for discussion(?).

within the next hour were locals used to the smell of burned creosote bush, and would easily have recognized it, as would I, a Phoenix resident in 1964.

Furthermore, I provided Dr. Hynek with clean, new plastic vials with their tops textured for writing, and watched him fill the vials with Creosote bush twigs that had been burned in the event and paper that was found in locations where the reported landing and take-off 'exhaust' might have been directed, either during conceivable braking of its approach from the northeast (according to the tourists who reported it to Opal Grinder and his son at the Whiting Brothers gas station on the north side of town) of during lift-off prior to horizontal and then nearly vertical disappearance in the vicinity of the Pearlite mill ~ a mile west of the landing site. Hynek gave these to a laboratory for the government, and as he later told the USAF in his report, and as he told me the very next time we talked, the laboratory found absolutely no residue from fuel burning.

As to the hot-air balloon idea, it simply contradicts the all things observed.

Hot air balloons absolutely do not land on four widely-spaced, girdered legs with large, wedge-shaped landing gear (as evidenced by the imprints of the landing gear). The legs were described by Zamora as, "girder like", so that's his description and not mine.

Those girder-like legs folded back into the object on lift-off. A balloon? Absolutely not!

Furthermore, as Zamora demonstrated to Hynek and me on Wednesday, April 29, 1964 (about 4.5 days after the event), that as he approached the object straight-on, his prescription glasses with sunshades were still very much in their intended place on his face. He could see things quite clearly, and there absolutely was no gondola or fuel burner under the object. In fact, Zamora was quite clear that the bright blue diverging 'exhaust' was roaring downward (and absolutely not upward as would the flame of burner on a balloon). Although it puzzled Lonnie because unlike rocked exhausts he had seen at White Sands Proving Ground launched, the powerful, roaring 'flame' bounced off nothing and seemed to knife into soil. He told Hynek and me in response to questioning, that by contrast to the column of blue light, the slightly orange periphery of the exhaust was stirring up some dust from the ravine bottom. As I said in the book, the intense blue stream of light seemingly penetrating into the ravine soils, suggests subatomic particles accelerated to relativistic velocity, for thrust. Perhaps there are other explanations, but one thing is for sure: It was not a plasma rocket exhaust. Plasma would have scattered all around and beyond, its ground-contact location.

Please note that the exhaust was very clearly observed to be coming out of an ~ 4' orifice centered on the bottom of the ~ 18' to 20' ellipsoid. (See the carefully done illustrations in my Socorro book.). "Ellipsoid" is my term, not Zamora's. He described the object as an elongated egg-shaped thing, seemingly made of a light-colored metal. It absolutely was not shaped as a light bulb, as would be a hot-air balloon back in those days.

Zamora walked to about 35 feet of the object, on an \sim north-south course, from where he got out of the patrol car. There was a rather brisk wind blowing out of the W-SW, according to both Zamora and Walter Shrode of Socorro Radio KSRC, who kept track of the weather for reporting it on the radio.

So, guess what! A skeptic's hot air balloon would have to rise up vertically and then in total silence zip off directly against a stiff breeze from the opposite direction,on a perfectly horizontal course for ~ 1 mile, then quickly climb up almost vertically (as least as viewed from the landing site) and out of sight in how many seconds? Twenty! Well, let's play conservative, contradict the observer, and say it only got as far as the Pearlite mill in that twenty seconds.

Guess what. That would still mean the balloon averaged 180 miles per hour flying directly into the stiff wind, just during its horizontal trip to the Pearlite mill.

Fine, but using facts and not a skeptic's imagination, on UFO

UpDates Brad Sparks demonstrated that the object became supersonic before it disappeared high in the sky.

So according to several lawmen's sense of smell within a short time after the object's take-off, there was no smell-recognizable odor of fuel or fuel-burning residue. In fact, several of the lawmen told me they specifically sniffed, expecting to detect such, with no success.

Hynek's samples confirmed that fact: No fuel residue of and kind.

I could say a whole lot more, but, heck, I'd rather hold some very important facts as surprises for when on Friday, October 2, at 1:30 to 3:30 eastern time (according to the present schedule), I'm going to both slay Bragalia's ludicrous declaration that the Socorro object was just a college prank, and bury the damnable thing so that future generations, which tend to remember only 'headlines' can know how much bovine feces was being thrown at not only a well-substantiated daylight CE III case, but in the face of a very observant and highly respected 1964 public servant, Lonnie Zamora.

In closing, I must ask each reader to think about this: Ask yourself, how many of those over-the-years accusations of inability to know what he's looking at, even within about 35 feet with his prescription glasses on, would have been hurled at the well-respected and highly objective (If you doubt that, read my book!) police officer-observer, had he been an Anglo?

Thanks, Victor for bringing out those matters, and thanks readers for your patience in reading this.

Argentina: Woman Visited by 14 'Extraterrestrials'

The event occurred at a house in Florencio Varela and the case promises to have worldwide repercussions

They were fourteen aliens in total. Suddenly, in the middle of the night, they were surrounding the bed she shared with her husband and small daughter. They looked at her silently, and at no moment did she feel fear. She wanted to wake up her husband, to have him witness what was occurring before her very eyes, but the Vistors advised her telepathically that he would remain asleep, as he was still not yet ready. Then, the beings revealed all of their secrets to her during a 40 minute time period. This is a 'contact' experience between a young woman from the town of Florencio Varela and a group of aliens - a case whose mysterious elements have the research community on tenterhooks, and promises to become known worldwide.

The entire episode forms part of an impressive investigation undertaken by the renowned founders of Grupo OVNI - Jorge Marron and Daniel Valverdi - who managed to secure an interview last week with the young woman, 23, who lives in a house in Florencio Varela along with her husband and child. I opened my eyes, but all I could see was the [pilot light] on the stove." explained Karina, on audio recordings broadcast on the Codigo OVNI radio show (FM Apuntes, Mondays, 22:00 hrs.)

"The fourth time that this happened, I felt it closer. I opened my eyes and saw the beings standing beside me. I was lying between my husband and my daughter. I uncovered myself and sat up. They were around the bed, fourteen of them, all of them short except for one: this last one was beside my husband, staring at him fixedly. The small ones were all around, and measured 1.30 meters or so. They were slightly taller than my bed's sommier, which is rather tall.", said the young woman.

In her description of the events to researches Marron and Valverdi, the witness explained that she tried to wake her husband, but was unable to do so. "I even dug my nails into him, but nothing. The baby was on the other side, on her stomach, but neither of them reacted. At that time, one of the beings told me not to wake up my husband, because he was not ready. I realize that they spoke to me telepathically, and I could answer them in the same way.", Karina explained.

"They were practically alike. The only difference was the height of one of their number. They were skinny, with long necks and small heads. Their eyes were black, like almonds, slanted, and their mouths were also small. They had little wrinkles on their face and the head was oval. They had shoulders; their fingers were long and had no nails.", described the woman, who was standing beside a group of aliens who touched her hair, the palms of her hands and lifted one of her arms.'

"Five of them were on the left, four facing me and five on the right side of the bed. I was the only one who wasn't paralyzed. We communicated for some 40 minutes, mouths closed. That is to say, I spoke by my mouth didn't move. I managed to touch one of the little ones, and he touched my face. I just felt the need to touch him, and in fact I felt peaceful in their company. I never had the impression that they could harm my daughter or any one of us.", Karina insists.

They had a skin tone that doesn't exist here."

"I recently read a curious little book entitled Flying Saucers - Key to Creation? by a 'George H. Eastland'. Despite the title, there's no channeling, contactee lore or New Age blather. Instead, this gentleman seems to be an old aerospace engineer who's seen a few things and thought long and hard about them. Very nuts and bolts type of guy, but with a surprising amount of insightful and intelligent speculation about the various ways flying saucers could work.

In this thought-provoking book, he tells an amazing story as a cautionary tale that things are not always as they seem and that there is more than one kind of UFO out there. Illustrated with diagrams from bar napkins and replete with fascinating technical details, the yarn was supposedly related to him by a biker called "Tea-Mex," whom he met at a now long-vanished bar during a motorcycle rally in New Hampshire many years ago. They fell to talking about motorcycles, and thence other machines, which led to flying saucers, and then the guy causally remarked that he'd built one once.

A do-it-yourself flying saucer

With a little prodding, Tea-Mex explained he was a machinist who at one time hung out with a bunch of fellows from some unnamed contractor to the military in central New Mexico. (Most likely involved with White Sands, because not only were they able to get custom-milled aluminum and steel parts, but practical advice from on-site aviation experts. But that's getting ahead of the story.)

Anyway, these guys started playing around with the design of a engine described in Popular Mechanics which consisted of two pistons on opposite ends of a rod shuttling back and forth between combustion chambers. Since the pistons didn't do anything but make a lot of hot compressed exhaust gas, it was

considered merely an impractical toy.

After melting a version cobbled out of old lawnmowers, the boys got serious. They machined parts at work, hiding them in a dumpster for later retrieval - "involuntary contributions from the aircraft industry" as Tea-Mex put it. By the time they were through, they basically had a vertically-mounted jet engine that spun like a gyroscope, powered by propane. Once they mounted a big fan atop it to increase the cooling airflow, the lift, combined with the thrust of the exhaust, was enough to allow the device to actually fly.

Of course, nothing for it then but to build a light frame with fixed landing gear, put a couple of chairs in for the pilot and engineer, and encase the frame in white aircraft aluminum. One sheet had an old logo on it which they attempted to paint over with abstract "characters" in red. They called their egg-shaped contraption "the Bean" because it looked somewhat like a lima bean mounted on four toothpicks.

Being essentially a really big flying gyro, the ship was quite tricky to maneuver, requiring two people, who dressed in jump suits with motorcycle helmets. On one test flight going into a strong headwind, the guys had to land abruptly in an arroyo right off a highway. But being spotted and chased by a local cop, they quickly hopped back in and took off again.

They weren't quite so lucky this time and some distance away suffered a crash landing that wrecked the Bean, though they were unhurt. But they were stuck: they couldn't patent or sell the damn thing because all the parts had been scrounged or otherwise ill-gotten. Nor, having been totally unlicensed, dare they come forward. So they secretly trashed the ship but didn't have the heart to junk the engine, which is still quietly rusting in somebody's garage somewhere out there. The end.

The biker finished his beer and rode off. Tea-Mex had never mentioned the policeman by name, though one of the guys had said he'd recognized him. Nor do any other identifying names whatsoever appear in the story.

But in all the annals of ufology, this tale could relate to one and only one case: the world-famous sighting by Socorro Police Sergeant Lonnie Zamora, who on April 24, 1964, saw and pursued a craft landing in a gully near Socorro. Two occupants emerged briefly but hastily re-entered the craft, which then took off with a flaming roar, leaving behind some of the best trace evidence ever collected.

The incident got a great deal of national attention. The head of Project Blue Book admitted that it was the "best-documented case on record." The story of the Bean fits the details exactly, even down to the funny symbol on the side of the craft and its near collision with a green Cadillac on the highway just before the landing, details which are not that widely known.

And it sounds very plausible, especially with all the engineering detail in the full story. Indeed, people at the time wondered if it wasn't some NASA lunar-landing gizmo being tested at nearby White Sands that had seriously gone astray. This was around the time the first prototypes of the LM were being experimented with there, after all. Plus the craft made a lot of noise and even started a fire in the bushes with its exhaust, which is not typical of most flying saucers.

Apparently, the vessel may have been a bit more astray from the military-industrial complex than anyone had thought, but not from anywhere near as far away as most imagined."

George H. Eastland being an aviation engineer should have recognized the Dyna-Cam engine invented in the US back in the early 1940s but earlier examples invented by many countries goes back to 1906 [wobble plate type engines, etc.]. The engine I'm referring to, the Dyna-Cam appears to originate from a design by the Blazer brothers, who worked for Studebaker in 1916. They sold the rights to Karl Herrmann, Studebaker's head of engineering. He developed it over many years, taking out a patent in 1941; see US patent 2237989.

The pistons shuttle back and forth in a revolver pistol type setup using lobes on the side of the connecting rods to drive the central crankshaft. The beauty of it was it only had about 7 moving parts. It was too late, however, to shift from conventional radials and watercooled engines like the Merlin so the engine was used instead in torpedos and driven by compressed air.

The Dyna-Cam came back in the 1980s and was produced in small numbers but never adopted by aviation. It could run as low as 75RPM and was very quiet, practically vibration free, small and efficient. It's still out there but as far as I know has never been certified for certified, factory-built aircraft; probably because that costs multi-millions of dollars.

The Italians invented a 'jet' engine back in the late 1930s. Its compressors [the fans] were drive by a conventional recip. engine, then additional fuel was introduced into the combustion stage. But that required two stages, two types of fuel adding more weight and was less efficient than just sticking a prop on the original recip. engine.

I don't give much credence to the hypothesis as proposed by Eastland. The story in Mechanics Illustrated was about the Dyna-Cam and the free piston engine which produces a jet exhaust. Could have been the latter that was referred to.

But let's not forget about control surfaces for this Lima Bean which in this case would have to had to be additional thrusters of some type plus something pushing the thing as well. Now you are into some major engineering. Where was this tested. They must have done something to insure that they didn't kill themselves. They apparently had no flying experience. I think this Lima Bean 'craft' is a gag.

Many People Can Explain Those Discs Each of Them Wants Thousand Dollar Reward

CHICAGO, July 12. (U.P.) - Hundreds of amateur scientists swamped the office of a Chicago industrialist today with letters "explaining" the "flying saucers" which have been whizzing through the sky.

Each of the writers wanted a \$1,000 reward offered by E. J. Culligan for a "flying saucer" in hand - or at least the correct explanation of the things people say they have been seeing.

Culligan, who was the first of several persons to offer rewards for capture of discs, said he'd received just about every answer in the book - ranging from red corpuscles on the eyeballs to reflections from melting icebergs.

"I have never thought so many people could have so many different explanations for the things," Culligan said.

He even got a score of telegrams from persons who wanted to be first with the "inside dope" on the discs.

W. R. Dodds, Brooklyn, N.Y., wired the red corpuscle theory. Edward Jackson, Reading, Pa., telegraphed that the disks really were bubbles from the wire dimestore bubble makers.

"Icebergs"

Jim Grill, Houston, Tex., wrote that the discs were reflections from melting icebergs. Here's how he said the phenomena occurs [sic]: When the fresh water in the bergs mixes with the salt water, oily rings of color are formed. The rings reflect against the iceberg, and, in turn, against the sky.

"As this iceberg disappears, so will the discs or saucers," Grill said.

T. A. Marshall of St. Louis was convinced the discs were nothing but "phosphorous silica" caught in huge wind drafts. He said he's all set to build a machine to make the things, just to prove his point.

From Los Angeles, Walter Hilgadiack sent three possible theories.

The saucers, he said, either were the reflection of the sun on the moon, the army signal corps trying to contact the moon by radar - or maybe even a return signal from the moon.

John A. Bruckner, Brooklyn, N.Y., a student of hypnosis, said "one of our enemies" had hypnotized the whole nation into thinking it was being bombarded by discs "to create a form of panic in this atomic age."

Culligan said he'd read every letter that has come into his office. $\label{eq:culligar}$

"Very interesting," he said. "But I'm still waiting for the answer."

I found interesting this tidbit that "the circles and shapes that appear on the fields are signals they employ among themselves". This comment coincides with some speculative research I started a couple of years ago. I proposed then that some of the crop formations appeared to be symbols denoting progress on a journey. I suggested that the formations are interstellar messages using as a channel the substrate in which physical reality is represented. Encoding a message in this channel would result in corresponding physical changes in the environment that could appear as crop formations. The crop formations would be an incidental side effect of the communication, which allows us to monitor the conversation among the aliens.

I selected a sequence of formations from 1996 onward that is consistent with a message context of 'expedition itinerary' suggested by a few key formations. The messages represented states one might encounter from the beginning to the end of an interstellar journey. The extracted message sequence is presented in "An alien itinerary decoded from crop formations" located at:

http://www.treurniet.ca/Itin/.

The messages were interpreted to say that a large group of ETs have recently arrived at our world. They describe vacating a home world, entering a stargate, leaving a stargate, flying through space, approaching gravity wells, and surrounding the earth. There is internal consistency across formations. For

example, the checkerboard pattern appears to represent the alien home world, a bird icon appears to represent one or more mother ships, a wing-like structure seems to represent smaller ships, and a sphere accompanied by the wing-like structures appears to represent a higher-dimensional space. The logical sequence and internal consistency argue that the messages are related and were authored by an intelligent agent.

The weakness of the methodology for extracting messages is that it involves subjective judgments. One can argue that I only got what I was looking for and so the message sequence was a self-fulfilling prophecy. However, there are model-based filters such as the Kalman filter that are conceptually similar. One begins with an expectation of what is to be found in order to ignore noise in the signal. So, yes, if the filter model is wrong, one will get output that is meaningless. Conversely, however, if the output of the filter makes sense then one can argue that the model is correct.

The message sequence also includes a paired sequence of formations and a particular combination of symbols within one of the pair that is thought to represent passage through something like a stargate. This spatio-temporal complex appeared once in 2001, once in 2008, and twice in 2009. If this interpretation is correct, the crop formations tell us of at least four arrivals to our region of 3D space.

The idea that at least some of the crop formations are interalien communications did not appear to catch on among crop circle devotees. I'm somewhat heartened that someone, apparently the aliens themselves, seem to agree with this interpretation. But just because there is evidence that some formations are "signals they employ among themselves" does not negate the possibility that other formations are meant for us. We just need to figure out the correct message context.

later. Might there have be two vehicles involved? Could the occupants have departed in a small helicopter tethering the device? He lost his glasses before it took off, his vision was poor, and he was already contaminated by having testified publicly on a radio program (with a showman host) before he was interviewed by others - where the townsfolk describe that interview as him having been force-fed.

Should we now lead in a debate about his vision problems and the fact his sun glasses skewed his color perception. That he actually lost his glasses during the sighting! That in an early interview he mentions the possibility that the crew did not board the vehicle. That there is evidence of a tethered surveyor test flight on April 24 at 7:45 AM... along with another test vehicle designed by Hughes which was tethered and self sufficient. That 37 companies competed for contracts for the surveyor programs and the like.

As we can see quite plainly, we have another problem with startruck advocates getting emotionally involved with cases and not willing or unable to bring up other aspects. But, let's hope that our own narrow mindedness doesn't necessarily lure us into single-minded solutions - boxed in without ability nor room to expand.

Once I saw Ray's post, my only interest was in an exchange with the actual investigator. An investigator who actually spoke with witnesses and was on the ground taking in the entire experience and exchanging with the witnesses.

I've learned quite convincingly that many cases have both major and minor flaws and it is the willingness of the investigator to discuss them that speaks well for them and the entire case - though it is often most unappreciated by both sides of the debate.

He was quite clear and emphatic. I did not bring up the case initially but was asking about his relationship with Barney Barnett. He was a BLM worker (not a VLA worker): that's the Bureau of Land Management.

>I suppose the inexperienced might mistake the smell of burned >sap of the creosote bushes (ignited by the bright, burning >diverging cone of blue 'flame' from beneath the object) as >residue from burned fuel, but all of those who visited the site >within the next hour were locals used to the smell of burned >creosote bush, and would easily have recognized it, as would I, >a Phoenix resident in 1964.

I lived in New Mexico (Roswell) and Phoenix. And creosote was exactly what I was thinking though I didn't want to suggest a specific plant.

>Furthermore, I provided Dr. Hynek with clean, new plastic vials >with their tops textured for writing, and watched him fill the >vials with Creosote bush twigs that had been burned in the event >and paper that was found in locations where the reported landing >and take-off 'exhaust' might have been directed, either during >conceivable braking of its approach from the northeast >(according to the tourists who reported it to Opal Grinder and >his son at the Whiting Brothers gas station on the north side of >town) of during lift-off prior to horizontal and then nearly >vertical disappearance in the vicinity of the Pearlite mill ~ a >mile west of the landing site. Hynek gave these to a laboratory >for the government, and as he later told the USAF in his report, >and as he told me the very next time we talked, the laboratory >found absolutely no residue from fuel burning.

That is not surprising given the source - If we are to be strictly equalized of the potential for both AF deception and the limits of detection of chemical residue under these circumstances. If a bush had been burning for a while, I certainly wouldn't expect to find residue from a portion of it's surface no longer in existence? I would have been more clever in obtaining my samples which clearly has to be demonstrated. And, wouldn't a burning bush (creosote bush) already contain a flavorful variety of hydrocarbons? I would have collected other samples for comparison - that were burned by various fuels. I'd have to see that analysis which I could then readily evaluate with confidence compared with the total. On the face of what I now know, I'd have to say it was greatly flawed.

>As to the hot-air balloon idea, it simply contradicts the all >things observed.

I brought it up simply because it contained certain elements that I would rather you could eliminate rather than myself. Why I jumped when I saw your post. Evidently, Zamora used the balloon word and another witness used the helicopter word: see my other post.

>Hot air balloons absolutely do not land on four widely-spaced, >girdered legs with large, wedge-shaped landing gear (as >evidenced by the imprints of the landing gear). The legs were >described by Zamora as, "girder like", so that's his description >and not mine.

Since he described it as large as a Volkswagen and later rather diminutively, I often wondered whether there were two vehicles involved. He was interviewed on public radio prior to your interview with him and we have to consider the possibility of contamination and alteration of the facts. Several of the townsfolk voluntarily said to me that he was force fed to say certain things as a result of that first radio interview - their words not mine! Hard to turn around a story in another direction if you're already visibly on public record saying something else. Let's also admit he had vision problems and was not tested for visual acuity that I'm aware of - again a Hynek investigative flaw?

>Those girder-like legs folded back into the object on lift-off. >A balloon? Absolutely not!

>Furthermore, as Zamora demonstrated to Hynek and me on >Wednesday, April 29, 1964 (about 4.5 days after the event), that >as he approached the object straight-on, his prescription

>glasses with sunshades were still very much in their intended >place on his face. He could see things quite clearly, and there >absolutely was no gondola or fuel burner under the object. In >fact, Zamora was quite clear that the bright blue diverging >'exhaust' was roaring downward (and absolutely not upward as >would the flame of burner on a balloon). Although it puzzled >Lonnie because unlike rocked exhausts he had seen at White Sands >Proving Ground launched, the powerful, roaring 'flame' bounced >off nothing and seemed to knife into soil. He told Hynek and me >in response to questioning, that by contrast to the column of >blue light, the slightly orange periphery of the exhaust was >stirring up some dust from the ravine bottom. As I said in the >book, the intense blue stream of light seemingly penetrating >into the ravine soils, suggests subatomic particles accelerated >to relativistic velocity, for thrust. Perhaps there are other >explanations, but one thing is for sure: It was not a plasma >rocket exhaust. Plasma would have scattered all around and >beyond, its ground-contact location.

Since I'm a scientist we can get into that if you wish. I don't understand how anyone would not have retained important samples. So, regardless of the extraordinary claims, I'm not yet impressed by the Hynek investigation effort.

>Please note that the exhaust was very clearly observed to be >coming out of an ~ 4' orifice centered on the bottom of the ~ >18' to 20' ellipsoid. (See the carefully done illustrations in >my Socorro book.). "Ellipsoid" is my term, not Zamora's. He >described the object as an elongated egg-shaped thing, seemingly >made of a light-colored metal. It absolutely was not shaped as a >light bulb, as would be a hot-air balloon back in those days.

>Zamora walked to about 35 feet of the object, on an ~ north->south course, from where he got out of the patrol car. There >was a rather brisk wind blowing out of the W-SW, according to >both Zamora and Walter Shrode of Socorro Radio KSRC, who kept >track of the weather for reporting it on the radio.

I've read that he was much further... over 100 feet - never closer. Are we talking yards or feet and why the discrepancy in the accounts?

>So, guess what! A skeptic's hot air balloon would have to rise >up vertically and then in total silence zip off directly against >a stiff breeze from the opposite direction,on a perfectly >horizontal course for ~ 1 mile, then quickly climb up almost >vertically (as least as viewed from the landing site) and out of >sight in how many seconds? Twenty! Well, let's play >conservative, contradict the observer, and say it only got as >far as the Pearlite mill in that twenty seconds.

Thanks for the wind data which could, evidently, still be verified. But, that would seem to rule out a balloon for sure!

>Guess what. That would still mean the balloon averaged 180 >miles per hour flying directly into the stiff wind, just during >its horizontal trip to the Pearlite mill.

I'm not certain under what circumstances timing was undertaken? And, wasn't Zamora with out glasses at this point? Is that data from more than one witness?

>Fine, but using facts and not a skeptic's imagination, on UFO >UpDates Brad Sparks demonstrated that the object became >supersonic before it disappeared high in the sky. That would not be difficult to show if the timing and position was correct. This is not difficult math.

>So according to several lawmen's sense of smell within a short
>time after the object's take-off, there was no smell>recognizable odor of fuel or fuel-burning residue. In fact,
>several of the lawmen told me they specifically sniffed,
>expecting to detect such, with no success.

I would expect they would have smelled the burning bush? I certainly feel I would have said I smelled something at closer range (?). The BLM worker I spoke to was there before anyone else arrived. He distinctly said that. So, I can't dismiss his testimony that lightly. I'm fairly certain I recorded that interview. Besides, can't ET's use similar fuels in a pinch :) So, I can't see how this strictly eliminates that possibility or

can drastically affect positions.

>Hynek's samples confirmed that fact: No fuel residue of and >kind.

>I could say a whole lot more, but, heck, I'd rather hold some >very important facts as surprises for when on Friday, October 2, >at 1:30 to 3:30 eastern time (according to the present >schedule), I'm going to both slay Bragalia's ludicrous >declaration that the Socorro object was just a college prank, >and bury the damnable thing so that future generations, which >tend to remember only 'headlines' can know how much bovine feces >was being thrown at not only a well-substantiated daylight CE >III case, but in the face of a very observant and highly >respected 1964 public servant, Lonnie Zamora.

I'm certainly not saying he wasn't! And, I'm anxious to learn more from you and will buy your book today. I may comment more after reading it. Though I'm interested in exotic propulsion systems, particle physics, and ufo reports, I'm afraid I'm not as well read as some in this field though I'm well informed scientifically. But, I often find that as an advantage since I'm not so resolutely glued to any particular case with religiouslike zealotry.

>In closing, I must ask each reader to think about this:. Ask >yourself, how many of those over-the-years accusations of >inability to know what he's looking at, even within about 35 >feet with his prescription glasses on, would have been hurled at >the well-respected and highly objective (If you doubt that, read >my book!) police officer-observer, had he been an Anglo?

>Thanks, Victor for bringing out those matters, and thanks >readers for your patience in reading this.

Thanks for your important firsthand position which must carry it's weight and fair hearing.

Hi Don,
When you actual do ground investigations and rewind events, one
can discover both major and minor flaws. An investigator's
willingness to discuss them often speaks equally about the sturdiness of the case itself. And, I'm always readily willing to discuss both in the pursuit of truth. Therefore, you would

discussing the positives - as I recently defended a SIP MUFON

case the was incorrectly debunked by them.

An example of ground research:

Missiles were actually launched from Datil, New Mexico and White Sands didn't want it advertised. There was an actual radar tower built there in the mid to late 1940's and was one of the first. And guess what? I found the man who was stationed there (later became a Texas Instrument manager). Not even the scientists that worked in Socorro knew about it for over 50 years. Not even CB Moore knew about it and he lived there! The foundation of the building is still there and the locals were still reluctant to talk about it. As a result of such experiences, I'm always open to the discovery process, even years later.

The radar was one of three constructed in a triangle - used during the early development of our first missile programs. (The other two were located in other parts of the state.) But, good luck finding it mentioned in the history books. I also found witnesses (two brothers) that did see a similar radio controlled LEM-type test vehicle in the Socorro area in the mid 1960's and when I spoke with them it was not at all in reference with the Socorro case.

When I interviewed the BLM (Bureau of Land Management) worker (not VLA worker) it was not about the Socorro case though he had brought it up without prompting and discussed the smell of burning fuel with the Zamora case. He got there before the others arrived. That is one other reason I brought up the wind direction - Depending upon ones approach to the scene of the incident (a brisk wind was acknowledged?) some may smell it and others would not.

The towns people recall Zamora's first interview on local radio, which is available, and felt he was influenced to say certain things in the excitement of his first public interview processes. Therefore, he may have been contaminated before anyone else interviewed him. One of the reasons I became more interested in alternative explanations and why they could suddenly gain some ground with me.

I also interviewed the host who conducted that interview. He was quite the showman. Unfortunately, that is what the locals considered when listening to his show and knew Zamora as well. Evidently, that host had many trysts with local young men (his self admission) - And, why, I believe his radio station was eventually burned to the ground... though he would tell another story and twist it in with the Zamora case and government conspiracy.

Yes, Viktor, I know. None of us is worthy to debate anything
with you. You are so beyond us in every conceivable way.
>We can often vacillate around seemingly fundamental issues
>because the juxtaposition of both weak and strong evidential >components can be weighed differently - each affecting the
>underpinnings of the other.
>Some of Zamora's testimony and others:
>"...The two legs were at the bottom of the object, slanted
>outwards to the ground." Zamora then got closer to the object,
>got out of his car, heard a loud roar, saw a flame, ran, bumped
>his leg, lost his glasses, and kept on going. He saw the object >fly up, and move 10 to 15 feet above the ground, and then leave >the area "traveling very fast."
You left out the part where Zamora reported complete silence once the object had lifted out of the arroyo. The departure at
high speed was in silence, perhaps the most significant part of his tetimony. (Of course, knowing the way you operate, you will probably label it one of those "weak evidential components" and
give zero weight to it.)
In the real world, complete silence rules out helicopters, jets, rockets, internal combustion engines, etc., etc. What we have
instead is a silent propulsion system capable of high
acceleration and achieving high speed.
But just how fast was "traveling very fast"? That's where the
```

physics comes in, which Viktor ignores, I guess another one of those "weak evidential components". As I wrote previously, if Ray Stanford's estimate of a 20 second departure (increased from Zamora's 10 second estimate) to fadeout in the distance (about 6 miles by Zamora's estimate), then the craft _averaged_ over 1000 mph in its departure, though its peak speed could have been much

higher, over 2000 mph if there were constant acceleration.

Incidentally, I've done visual experiments which demonstrate

that Zamora's fadeout distance of 6 miles is quite reasonable given standard visual acuity. I found that it could have been as high as 8 miles with very good seeing conditions or as low as 2.5 miles with a lot of haze and sun glare. But Zamora was certainly in the ball park in terms of feasible fadeout distance.

So if you want to push some "helicopter" theory, you not only need to ignore the silence testimony, you need to somehow decrease the speed by absurd amounts, say triple the departure time and assume a bare minimum fadeout distance, let's say 2 miles. This cuts the average speed by a factor of 9, down to 120 mph, though the peak speed would have to be substantially higher than this, perhaps 240 mph with constant acceleration. (Unless Viktor also wants to make another absurd assumption that the "helicopter" instantly achieved 120 mph speed).

That's getting pretty close to impossible for our magical silent helicopter, which, incidentally (or have you forgotten Viktor?) is towing a multi-ton object (calculations based on soil depression). Perhaps with your superior knowledge of everything, you can point us to a helicopter back then that can do all that.

>He radioed his dispatcher to >look out his window for 'an object... it looks like a >balloon.'

It looks like a balloon, therefore it is a balloon. Brilliant logic. Or is it a helicopter, or a Surveyor landing craft? Or some college prank with fireworks? Damn, I can't keep all these definitive "explanations" straight?

>Nearby, the bushes were still smoldering. News reports in the >local paper, El Defensor Chieftain, also mentioned "an >unidentified tourist" who remarked about how " aircraft flew low >around here," and that the strange object was a 'funny-looking >helicopter, if that's what it was'."

"If that's what it was", therefore it was a helicopter. More brilliant logic.

 $>\!\!$ As we can see, both helicopter and balloon are mentioned by $>\!\!$ witnesses.

Earth to Viktor. Looks like does not equal is. Instead, this sounds like the usual human response of first trying to match an unknown with something known.

>And if Zamora saw a small landed helicopter

Oh, the small landed helicopter that leaves no depressions on the ground and takes off and departs silently towing a multi-ton object--that small helicopter?

>it might

>be described as the size of a Volkswagen since it deviates

>the size of the smaller vehicle he described

Baloney. The object he described was 15 to 20 feet in length, observations strongly supported by the four landing pad depressions left behind.

>and focused on

>later. Might there have be two vehicles involved?

You forgot to throw in the flying monkeys.

You also forgot the part where Ray Stanford determined that Zamora got to within 35 feet of the oval object. He got within 35 feet and couldn't determine he was dealing with a helicopter?

Do helicopters blast off? Do they burn the ground and foliage. Can they go completely silent? Can they fly off at hundreds of miles an hour while towing a multi-ton object on a cable? Can they climb steep mountainsides while doing so (another part of Zamora's testimony you neglect)?

No doubt to this Viktor will say, no he didn't approach the helicopter. He approached a Surveyor landing craft that blased

off, but being towed by the helicopter, without ever explaining where the helicopter was hiding, why it left no physical trace, and how it could be silent. Nor will he bother to explain how the very un-Socorro-like Surveyor in size, weight, and shape could morph into what Zamora saw and what the physical trace evidence indicates he saw and described.

>Could the
>occupants have departed in a small helicopter tethering the
>device?

Yes, the silent helicopter that left no trace evidence behind, such as landing skid marks.

>He lost his glasses before it took off, his vision was >poor,

This is the typical "lost his glasses" red herring and also a highly inaccurate rendition of what Zamora actually reported. He did NOT lose his glasses BEFORE it took off. (Show us Viktor where he said that.) He approached CLOSE to the object with his glasses on. When the object started to take off, he was terrified, thinking it might explode. He turned around and started scrambling back out of the arroyo, shooting looks over his shoulder, glasses still on. When he got back to his car on the rim of the arroyo, he bumped into it, and at this point lost his glasses. He ran beyond his car and dived for cover, turned around and watched the object lift up out of the arroyo, then go completely silent (what do his glasses have to do with this part?), and then depart horizontally at high speed.

He then ran back to his car, quickly retrieved his glasses, and watched the object leave the scene and fadeout in the distance, _with his glasses on_.

Time without glasses--maybe 20 seconds. Effect on critical details of the sighting--zero.

It is pretty clear that Viktor and many others have no idea what visual acuity is measuring. As I've repeatedly pointed out, traffic cops have to have at least 20/100 acuity without correction to pass their physicals. If 20/20 is standard acuity, 20/100 means they can just read a line of letters at 20 feet that is five times as large as a 20/20 line.

20/20 letters are about 9 mm high at 20 feet. (Designed so that width of black and white portions of letters are all 1 minute of arc wide) Thus 20/100 letters are 45 mm or about 2 inches high at 20 feet. If Zamora dashed 100 feet away where he dived for cover, then 20/100 acuity means he could just discern letters about 10 inches high made up of lines about 2 inches wide.

But the oval object was 15-20 feet long, and perhaps half as wide. Would he have any problems seeing that? No, of course not. Visual acuity is a measure of how well we see fine detail, not the gross stuff. So the edges of the object would have been a little fuzzy, but he would have had no trouble seeing the much bigger details, such as the entire object itself.

That's why I say bringing up his vision without his glasses on is a red herring. Nothing critical in his observations was affected by his glasses being off. And, of course, his visual acuity, glasses or no glasses, had no effect on his ability to detect the object going completely silent as it made its departure, the critical detail that you'll notice Viktor never brings up.

>and he was already contaminated by having testified
>publicly on a radio program (with a showman host) before he was
>interviewed by others - where the townsfolk describe that
>interview as him having been force-fed.

Ray Stanford will have to chime in here, but from what I've read, both he and Hynek went over and over the testimony with Zamora, and he didn't waver in his story nor did he exaggerate or keep elaborating on it.

But I guess Viktor has the will to believe that Zamora must have been easily programmed by some radio guy into a particular story and was incapable of thinking on his own.

>Should we now lead in a debate about his vision problems and

>fact his sun glasses skewed his color perception.

What does color perception have to do with the most critical parts of it? Is that why he thought the object went dead silent as it departed?

>That he

>actually lost his glasses during the sighting!

Red herring, as explained above. It had no effect on critical details reported by Zamora.

>That in an early

>interview he mentions the possibility that the crew did not >board the vehicle.

Just sounds like a cop weighing various possibilities. Obviously Viktor is trying to suggest the little guys in their coveralls jumped into their silent, invisible helicopter and made a fast escape.

>That there is evidence of a tethered surveyor >test flight on April 24 at 7:45 AM... along with another test >vehicle designed by Hughes which was tethered and self >sufficient. That 37 companies competed for contracts for the >surveyor programs and the like.

And all of these where flying dozens of miles off-range 10 hours later, and silently too when they departed? And these "surveyor" test craft were oval shaped, multi-tonned, and 15-20 feet in length?

>As we can see quite plainly, we have another problem with star->truck advocates getting emotionally involved with cases and not >willing or unable to bring up other aspects.

Maybe it's more the case that we "star-struck" advocates don't like to waste our time on on magical thinking, red herrings, and inane, hand-waving arguments. Viktor apparently doesn't suffer from any of these handicaps.

>But, let's hope

>that our own narrow mindedness doesn't necessarily lure us into >single-minded solutions - boxed in without ability nor room to >expand.

Yes, let's consider ALL possibilities, no matter how absurd or impossible. Has Viktor yet considered the flying monkeys, or is he too narrow-minded to go down that path?

>Once I saw Ray's post, my only interest was in an exchange with >the actual investigator. An investigator who actually spoke with >witnesses and was on the ground taking in the entire experience >and exchanging with the witnesses.

>I've learned quite convincingly that many cases have both major >and minor flaws and it is the willingness of the investigator to >discuss them that speaks well for them and the entire case - >though it is often most unappreciated by both sides of the >debate.
