One of the most brazen UFO demonstrations in the U.S. went down on Nov. 7, 2006, when "a number of highly reliable airline employees and others reported seeing a round, revolving, gray, metallic appearing object" over the congested skies of Chicago's O'Hare International Airport. That was the consensus description issued in a study assembled by the National Aviation Reporting Center on Anomalous Phenomena the following year.

What made this one especially dramatic was the circular hole the thing made in the low cloud layer as it ascended and left the scene. Debunkers tried to ascribe it to a rare meteorological event known as a punch-hole cloud, but the NARCAP analysis revealed the temperatures at that altitude weren't conducive to those conditions.

Even more compelling was the somewhat awkward control-tower chatter about a flying disc in the United Airlines terminal vicinity. Those conversations were recorded by the FAA and acquired through through FOIA.

There were reportedly more than a dozen witnesses, of whom NARCAP managed to query eight, from airline pilots to ramp mechanics. Significantly, not a one would allow their names to become public.

The wall of anonymity appeared to crack this week, when an ostensible wrestling fan named Sam Peterson told his story to a goofy niche site called Ringside Report. Peterson identified himself as a 29-year-old former O'Hare custodian. He submitted his mug shot for publication, and declared he'd seen the whole thing. He described the UFO as "silver and enormous", and claimed "it was just hovering over the planes that were grounded for minutes." And then: "We had a mandatory meeting and were told that we were not allowed to speak with anyone and that included family and friends!" He stated that photos taken by a colleague were "seized by the goons that we met that day," and that he, Peterson, was fired for speaking against the gag order.

And, although the HBP claims to have an ethics division looking at that problem, one member of the Existential Risk group seems to think we may be sleep-walking into a 'Pandora's box moment with artificial intelligence that, if missed, could be catastrophic'.

Careful reading of the full report reveals that 25-33 percent of the reports remained unsolved. Condon's personal views and his laissez-faire oversight contributed to the personality conflicts, hypocrisy, and incompetence of the work and to the overall negative tone of the report's executive summary (conclusion). Media reviewers read only the conclusion and scanned the numerous technical chapters thereby contributing to downplaying any need for further study. Case studies and a brief history of UFOs lead to the "scientific context" chapters, e.g. perception and reporting, optics, radar, sonic boom, atmospheric electricity and plasma, and balloons. Twenty-four appendices give the flavor of U.S. government handling of UFO reports from the late 1940s through the late 1960s. Critics such as Dr. J. Allen Hynek, USAF con-sultant on Project Blue Book, and Dr. James E. McDonald, a University of Arizona atmospheric physicist, stated the Condon Report was a setup to rid the USAF of its public relations nightmare and that some allegedly explained cases were actually unknowns, respectively. for the complete study on-line (Condon, 1969). "The 1968 Scientific Study of Unidentified Flying Objects is presented complete with graphics, equations and photographs. This was the final report of a US Air Force-funded university study performed by Edward U. Condon et al. It is sometimes called "Project Blue Book", named after the Air Force structure for handling UFO reports prior to 1966." [Published review of Terry W. Colvin in Fortean Times] The U.S. Air Force beat a hasty retreat out of the official UFO business following an independent evaluation of its work by the University of Colorado. Headed by physicist Edward Condon, the two-year Scientific Study of Unidentified Flying Objects drew three conclusions:

- 1) UFOs didn't represent a technology beyond the 1969 level of understanding;
- 2) they didn't threaten national security; and
- 3) continued study of the phenomenon probably wouldn't

contribute anything to modern science (Condon, 1969).

Statement by Dr. McDonald: "The Condon Report, released in January, 1968, after about two years of Air Force-supported study is, in my opinion, quite inadequate. The sheer bulk of the Report, and the inclusion of much that can only be viewed as "scientific padding", cannot conceal from anyone who studies it closely the salient point that it represents an examination of only a tiny fraction of the most puzzling UFO reports of the past two decades, and that its level of scientific argumentation is wholly unsatisfactory. Further- more, of the roughly 90 cases that it specifically confronts, over 30 are conceded to be unexplained. With so large a fraction of unexplained cases (out of a sample that is by no means limited only to the truly puzzling cases, but includes an objectionably large number of obviously trivial cases), it is far from clear how Dr. Condon felt justified in concluding that the study indicated "that further extensive study of UFOs probably cannot be justified in the expectation that science will be advanced thereby (Condon, 1969).

Insufficient information is when one or more elements of information essential for evaluation are missing. UFOlogists complain that the insufficient information and identified categories were lumped together to improve their numbers. This is what happened but it seems for less than sinister reasons. Ruppelt just seemed more interested in weeding out the unidentified cases to study them than wasting effort over reports that could never be solved one way or the other. The lumping together with the identifieds became policy and, unfortu- nately, resulted in a somewhat skewed result when examining how many cases were actually unsolved. The United States Air Force saw the greatest number of UFO reports generated in 1952 than in any other year of the project. With such a vast number of reports, Ruppelt, with his small staff, had difficulty in resolving them. They received 1501 reports in 1952 according to USAF records. Of these, 303 were classified as unidentified. Considering the size of his staff, one would think that an 80% solution rate would be impressive but in reality not that many were solved. A significant number of the remaining 1198 were classified as insufficient information (roughly 20% of the total number).

This study evaluates factors related to the USAF investigation of Unidentified Flying Objects in an attempt to determine whether or not additional UFO investigation is warranted. The approach to analysis taken by this study was twofold: one writer evaluated evidence justifying the closure of Project Blue Book while the other writer evaluated evidence supporting its reopening. Based on the evidence uncovered, the study concludes that there is a definite need for a new

UFO investigation.

The study recommends that such an investigation should be a scientific undertaking free from bias, political pressure, and USAF or DoD (Dept. of Defense) jurisdiction. The official Air Force explanation regarding the Hills' UFO sighting turned out to be almost as erratic as the radar and visual sightings themselves. The official explanations in this particular case included "weather inversion", "the Planet Jupiter", "optical condition", and finally "insufficient data". This study recommends a new UFO study should be initiated under the guidance of a congressional sub-committee.

No Defense Department agencies should be directly involved in the study. A national UFO organization should be created whose membership is comprised of scientists and astronomers with respected professional reputations and proven ability. Fascinating this apparent anti-USAF study was written by a Major and a Captain in the U.S. Air Force at Maxwell Air Force Base, Alabama.

It was not the task of the Panel to conduct its own study of UFOs or to invite advocates, scientifically trained or not, of various points of view to hearings. The task was to study the University's Report and to assess: First, its scope; namely, did the Report, in the opinion of the Panel, cover those topics that a scientific study of UFO phenomena should have embraced? Second, its methodology; namely, did the Report, in the opinion of the Panel, reveal an acceptable scientific methodology and approach to the subject? Third, its findings; namely, were the conclusions and interpretations warranted by the evidence and analyses as presented in the Report and were they reasonable? Ten chapters are devoted to perceptual problems, processes of perception and reporting, psychological aspects of UFO reports, optics, radar, sonic boom, atmospheric electricity and plasma interpretations, balloons, instrumentation for UFO searches, and statistical analyses. (Twenty-four appendices add detailed technical background to the study). In our opinion the scope of the study was adequate to its purpose: a scientific study of UFO phenomena.

Why was this source selected (importance or value/interest to you)? This web site is of interest because it offers maps and statistical analysis in a subject area that is rife with innuendo, skeptics, true believers, and a group of UFO hobbyists and researchers who are better labeled as the "UFO discommunity."

Brief summary of source: The *U* UFO DATABASE is a serious 18 year effort to catalog, map, and perform statistical functions on a filtered set of UFO sightings throughout history. Having passed through several platforms, *U* is now a large stand-alone DOS application, written in C-language for PC, with data and other supporting files. As of December, 2003 *U* holds over 18,120 carefully filtered UFO events distilled from hundreds of books, major journals, catalogs, downloads and other sources. Scope is world-wide, for all dates from antiquity to the present. Junk "UFOs" (night-lights, fireballs, discovered hoaxes

etc.) are systematically filtered out. Otherwise, *U* would bloat to several times its present size.

Implications of this information for Behavioral Research Design, Tests, & Measurement: The implication is that anecdotal data is always suspect information. An observation by one "hostile" skeptic of UFO reports in general and alien abduction in particular is "the plural of anecdote is not data." However, the filtered database developed by Larry Hatch is the most reliable statistical review of UFO sightings.

Presentation Strategy: To inform my peers of the need to question statistics and the agenda of the individual or organization presenting the data.

In the Fall of 1967, a small team of radio astronomers came face-to-face with a profound mystery that they didn't want to be

At one point they half-seriously thought about destroying the data and staying stone silent. That's because announcing it to the world could open a Pandora's box for science, and derail at least one astronomer's PhD thesis.

A small group of radio astronomers in the United Kingdom had stumbled upon clock-precision radio pulses coming from deep space. The signal was unlike anything ever seen before or even predicted in astronomy. In the absence of a natural explanation, the researchers pondered, for three long weeks, whether this was really a "hello" from an extraterrestrial civilization.

The team faced a cultural black hole with regard to the public response. How do you verify the signal? How do you announce it to the world? Do you send a reply to the stars, or is that too dangerous?

As is the case in our compulsive universe, nature was cleverer than imagined. NASA Rover Finds Conditions Once Suited For Ancient Life On Mars

March 12, 2013

PASADENA, Calif. -- An analysis of a rock sample collected by NASA's Curiosity rover shows ancient Mars could have supported living microbes.

Scientists identified sulfur, nitrogen, hydrogen, oxygen, phosphorus and carbon - some of the key chemical ingredients for life - in the powder Curiosity drilled out of a sedimentary rock near an ancient stream bed in Gale Crater on the Red Planet last month.

"A fundamental question for this mission is whether Mars could have supported a habitable environment, " said Michael Meyer, lead scientist for NASA's Mars Exploration Program at the agency's headquarters in Washington. "From what we know now, the answer is yes."

Clues to this habitable environment come from data returned by the rover's Sample Analysis at Mars (SAM) and Chemistry and Mineralogy (CheMin) instruments. The data indicate the Yellowknife Bay area the rover is exploring was the end of an ancient river system or an intermittently wet lake bed that could have provided chemical energy and other favorable conditions for microbes. The rock is made up of a fine-grained mudstone containing clay minerals, sulfate minerals and other chemicals. This ancient wet environment, unlike some others on Mars, was not harshly oxidizing, acidic or extremely salty.

The patch of bedrock where Curiosity drilled for its first sample lies in an ancient network of stream channels descending from the rim of Gale Crater. The bedrock also is fine-grained mudstone and shows evidence of multiple periods of wet conditions, including nodules and veins.

Curiosity's drill collected the sample at a site just a few hundred yards away from where the rover earlier found an ancient streambed in September 2012.

"Clay minerals make up at least 20 percent of the composition of this sample, " said David Blake, principal investigator for the CheMin instrument at NASA's Ames Research Center in Moffett Field, Calif.

These clay minerals are a product of the reaction of relatively fresh water with igneous minerals, such as olivine, also present in the sediment. The reaction could have taken place within the sedimentary deposit, during transport of the sediment, or in the source region of the sediment. The presence of calcium sulfate along with the clay suggests the soil is neutral or mildly alkaline.

Scientists were surprised to find a mixture of oxidized, less-oxidized, and even non-oxidized chemicals, providing an energy gradient of the sort many microbes on Earth exploit to live. This partial oxidation was first hinted at when the drill cuttings were revealed to be gray rather than red.

"The range of chemical ingredients we have identified in the sample is impressive, and it suggests pairings such as sulfates and sulfides that indicate a possible chemical energy source for micro-organisms," said Paul Mahaffy, principal investigator of the SAM suite of instruments at NASA's Goddard Space Flight Center in Greenbelt, Md.

An additional drilled sample will be used to help confirm these results for several of the trace gases analyzed by the SAM instrument.

"We have characterized a very ancient, but strangely new 'gray Mars' where conditions once were favorable for life," said John Grotzinger, Mars Science Laboratory project scientist at the California Institute of Technology in Pasadena, Calif.
"Curiosity is on a mission of discovery and exploration, and as a team we feel there are many more exciting discoveries ahead of us in the months and years to come."

Scientists plan to work with Curiosity in the "Yellowknife Bay" area for many more weeks before beginning a long drive to Gale Crater's central mound, Mount Sharp. Investigating the stack of layers exposed on Mount Sharp, where clay minerals and sulfate minerals have been identified from orbit, may add information about the duration and diversity of habitable conditions.

NASA's Mars Science Laboratory Project has been using Curiosity to investigate whether an area within Mars' Gale Crater ever has offered an environment favorable for microbial life. Curiosity, carrying 10 science instruments, landed seven months ago to begin its two-year prime mission. NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Pasadena, Calif., manages the project for NASA's Science Mission Directorate in Washington.

De Void will cop to slow-response reflexes but this one probably takes The Clogged Artery Prize, because a nerve ending or a synapse or whatever should've fired back in 2011. That's when, in the aftermath of MUFON's published analysis of the UFO that apparently buzzed President Bush's Texas ranch in 2008, the Federal Aviation Administration decided to exempt ERIT from public scrutiny.

ERIT, or En Route Intelligence Tool, gathers raw data from individual radar sites collecting ping returns on everything that flies in U.S. air space, and sometimes things that don't fly at all. It's a bit of a jumble because it can pick up everything - hills, contrails, storm turbulence, false echoes, birds, etc. In fact, ERIT picks up so much extraneous material that air traffic controllers usually don't see it. What shows up on ATC screens instead are combined subsets of ERIT returns, filtered by the FAA, which focuses largely on planes with transponders. Low-flying helicopters and light aircraft operating away from commercial airports and below the major skytraffic corridors aren't required to have transponders and therefore don't light up the screens. UFOs aren't known for packing transponder beacons, either.

Anyhow, in 2008, Glen Schulze and Robert Powell filed FOIAs with a number of government acronyms, civilian and military, to establish the UFO's path. The FAA supplied them with unfiltered ERIT returns. The data not only substantiated eyewitness UFO accounts of its southeasterly trajectory, it also confirmed eyewitness reports of jet fighters in the area, which the Air Force initially denied.

gravitationally and optically? In such a case a known brightness
and a known mass would limit the surface area and thereby the
density for a range of albedos and might serve to discriminate a

Sixteen years ago this week, the so-called Phoenix Lights phenomenon stunned thousands of Arizonans, eventually attracted global media, evoked a belated eyewitness confession from then-Gov. And although UFO sightings continue to unfurl across Arizona, the trail of clues relating to the 1997 incident grows colder with each passing year.

That's why it's good to see Grand Canyon State media, at least in a token way, still fanning the dying embers every now and then, especially on anniversaries that don't end with a 0 or a 5. It'd be great if those Rangers had some hard data to share, but lacking that, the burden, as usual, shifts to eyewitness credibility. And as the late Sufi philosopher Idries Shah reminds us, "Opinion is usually something which people have when they lack comprehensive information."



I have uploaded a searchable copy of a 160 page long English translation of Felix Zigel's book "Observations of UFO's In The USSR : Volume 3"(1978) to the link below:

Russian ufologist Mikhail Gershtein has previously mentioned having been repeatedly told by Tatyana Felix'ovna Zigel (Zigel's widow and keeper of Zigel's archive) that she only want to see her husband's works published and doesn't want any money.

A copy of this translation was included in the middle of one of a number of PDF files released online jointly by MUFON and Blackvault.com a few years ago (apparently as part of MUFON's Pandora Project, although I can't be sure as I still haven't obtained reliable detailed information on that project...). That file was labelled on the relevant Blackvault webpage (apparently no longer available other than via the Wayback Machine's Internet Archive) as being "Case File #2: DIA Documents released during this case" under "Ground Saucer Watch (GSW) v. Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) File". I don't recall anyone mentioning this translation appearing in that PDF file.

From material I posted a few months ago from Skylook and MUFON's Journal about prior translations of some of Zigel's books, it seems that MUFON has been involved in generating two (apparently separate) translations of Volume 1 of Zigel's "Observations of UFOs in the USSR", one in the early 1970s and another one in the early 1990s. When it published information about the second translation of Volume 1, MUFON's Journal didn't refer to the earlier translation that MUFON had been involved in producing of that volume. Indeed, an article in MUFON's Journals about that second translation stated that Zigel's writings had previously been unavailable to Westerners and not previously translated. That's the sort of thing I have in mind when I keep going on (and on and on...) about reinvention of the wheel within ufology. I've posted on one of MUFON's Facebook pages that I hope that posting Volume 3 will result in Volume 1 (in any of its translations) being made available online so that it doesn't have to be translated yet again!

Do you remember the time President Obama shook hands with Iranian president Ahmadinejad? If you took part in a recent psychological study, it's possible that you will. More than 5,000 participants were presented with doctored photographs representing fabricated political events, with around half claiming to have memories for the false scenarios (Obama has, of course, never shaken hands with the Iranian president). Part of a decades-long program of research by psychologist Elizabeth Loftus, the latest study provides a neat demonstration of how our memories are created in the present rather than being faithful records of the past.

The popular perception of memory shows a considerable lag with the new scientific consensus. The psychologists Daniel J. Simons and Christopher Chabris have conducted two large-scale surveys showing that roughly half of respondents thought that memory works like a video recorder. And although many people do recognize that their memories are fallible, there is much less understanding of precisely how and why they fail us.

Organic Molecule Detected In Space By Tony Wu

For many years, scientists have speculated when and where life originated on Earth. Diverse theories range from cosmic deliveries of organic compounds to local synthesis of amino acids in the Primordial Soup of a young Earth. Some theories settle with a compromise between the two. The most popular idea suggests an Earth bombarded by comets and asteroids which brought building blocks of life onto the planet. This notion hinges on one important premise: that there are organic compounds in outer space.

As telescope technologies have vastly diversified since Galileo's age, we have come to analyze specific wavelengths of light that characterize the various phenomena of space, like supernovas and solar activities. Recently, scientists have developed a technique to analyze new type of data; namely, the chemical composition of space to detect organic molecules. The astrochemists - the combined profession of an astronomer and a chemist - uses radio frequencies to classify various molecules, which inherently have different atomic compositions and structures which alter radio waves that reach the telescope.

Astronomers turned their focus to one of the giant gas clouds near the center of the galaxy to analyze the identities of molecules that compose it. By analyzing the radio frequencies gathered by the Green Bank Telescope in West Virginia, astrochemists determined that a molecule called cyanomethanimine is present in the cloud of gases.

Anthony Remijan, a researcher at the National Radio Astronomy Observatory, explained that cyanomethanimine is a precursor of adenin, one of the four building blocks of DNA. Scientists believe that the detection of cyanomethanimine encourages the theory that there are organic compounds in space. In addition to cyanomethanimine, scientists also found a compound called ethanamine which is a key component in the formation of alanine, an amino acid that is crucial in genetic coding.

NASA TECHNICAL REPORTS DATABASE GOES DARK

This week NASA abruptly took the massive NASA Technical Reports Server (NTRS) offline. Though no explanation for the removal was offered, it appeared to be in response to concerns that export controlled information was contained in the collection.

"Until further notice, the NTRS system will be unavailable for public access. We apologize for any inconvenience this may cause you and anticipate that this site will return to service in the near future," the NTRS homepage now states.

NASA Public Affairs did not respond yesterday to an inquiry about the status of the site, the reason for its suspension, or the timeline for its return.

NASA Watch linked the move to a statement from Rep. Frank Wolf on Monday concerning alleged security violations at NASA Langley Research Center.

"NASA should immediately take down all publicly available technical data sources until all documents that have not been subjected to export control review have received such a review and all controlled documents are removed from the system," Rep. Wolf said.

In other words, all NASA technical documents, no matter how voluminous and valuable they are, should cease to be publicly available in order to prevent the continued disclosure of any restricted documents, no matter how limited or insignificant they may be.

"There is a HUGE amount of material on NTRS," said space policy analyst Dwayne Day. "If NASA is forced to review it all, it will never go back online."

Essentially, the mindset represented by Rep. Wolf and embraced by NASA fears the consequences of unauthorized disclosure more than it values the benefits of openness. It is a familiar outlook that has wreaked havoc with the nation's historical declassification program, and has periodically disrupted routine

access to record collections at the National Archives, as well as online collections at the CIA, the Los Alamos technical report library, and elsewhere.

"I'd also note that a large amount of historical Mercury/Gemini/Apollo documents that were previously available at NARA Fort Worth is now apparently withdrawn due to ITAR [export controls], " said Dr. Day.

The upshot is that the government is not an altogether reliable repository of official records. Members of the public who depend on access to such records should endeavor to make and preserve their own copies whenever possible.

I'm sure other researchers have already converted Geipan's two CSV database files into better looking Excel/PDF files than me but, since I haven't seen anyone post them, I've uploaded my own fast and rudimentary conversions at the link below:

My own quick and dirty conversions are all I need for my purposes, so I haven't sought to resolve a few issues with them (e.g. the importing of about 20 of the rows resulted in information being in the wrong columns, which I could resolve manually by searching for the "|" character). Since I'm sure this has all been done by other researchers already, I haven't sought to do this. Anyway, I thought these Excel and PDF versions of the Geipan databases (and the two combined searchable case files) might be useful to some others.

The process I used to create the Excel and PDF files was to:

(1) Download the two relevant CSV files using the links below:

- (2) Open Excel
- (3) Create a new blank document in Excel
- (4) Click on import from text file and load one of the CSV database
- (5) Set the options to indicate use of a delimiter and set the delimiter to be "Other" and input \mid
- (6) Set cell alignment formatting options to wrap text
- (7) Alter column widths to narrow each of them
- (8) Save the Excel file
- (9) Print as PDF, setting option to landscape, no margins and fit all columns on page
- I've also uploaded a searchable PDF version of the Geipan files on the Trans-En-Provence (January 1981) incident for an item I'm

writing about the Rockefeller Briefing Document (which has a chapter devoted to that incident).

UFOs Or No? The Guy Hottel Memo

It's the most popular file in the FBI Vault - our high-tech electronic reading room housing various Bureau records released under the Freedom of Information Act. Over the past two years, this file has been viewed nearly a million times. Yet, it is only a single page, relaying an unconfirmed report that the FBI never even followed up on.

The file in question is a memo dated March 22, 1950 - 63 years ago last week. It was authored by Guy Hottel, then head of our field office in Washington, D.C. (see sidebar below for a brief biography). Like all memos to FBI Headquarters at that time, it was addressed to Director J. Edgar Hoover and recorded and indexed in FBI records.

The subject of the memo was anything but ordinary. It related a story told to one of our agents by a third party who said an Air Force investigator had reported that three "flying saucers" were recovered in New Mexico. The memo provided the following detail:

"They [the saucers] were described as being circular in shape with raised centers, approximately 50 feet in diameter. Each one was occupied by three bodies of human shape but only three feet tall, dressed in metallic cloth of a very fine texture. Each body was bandaged in a manner similar to the blackout suits used by speed fliers and test pilots."

After relaying an informant's claim that the saucers had been found because the government's "high-powered radar" in the area had interfered with "the controlling mechanism of the saucers," the memo ends simply by saying that "[n]o further evaluation was attempted" concerning the matter by the FBI agent.

That might have been the end of this particular story, just another informational dead end in the FBI files. But when we launched the Vault in April 2011, some media outlets noticed the Hottel memo and erroneously reported that the FBI had posted proof of a UFO crash at Roswell, New Mexico and the recovery of wreckage and alien corpses. The resulting stories went viral, and traffic to the new Vault soared.

So what's the real story? A few facts to keep in mind:

First, the Hottel memo isn't new. It was first released publicly in the late 1970s and had been posted on the FBI website for several years prior to the launch of the Vault.

Second, the Hottel memo is dated nearly three years after the infamous events in Roswell in July 1947. There is no reason to believe the two are connected. The FBI file on Roswell (another popular page) is posted elsewhere on the Vault [link].

Third, as noted in an earlier story [link], the FBI has only occasionally been involved in investigating reports of UFOs and extraterrestrials. For a few years after the Roswell incident, Director Hoover did order his agents – at the request of the Air Force – to verify any UFO sightings. That practice ended in July 1950, four months after the Hottel memo, suggesting that our Washington Field Office didn't think enough of that flying saucer story to look into it.

Finally, the Hottel memo does not prove the existence of UFOs; it is simply a second- or third-hand claim that we never investigated. Some people believe the memo repeats a hoax that was circulating at that time, but the Bureau's files have no information to verify that theory.

Sorry, no smoking gun on UFOs. The mystery remains=E2=80=A6

Guy Hottel Biography

Guy L. Hottel was born around 1902. He was a graduate of George Washington University in Washington, D.C., where he was a star football player. He was later inducted into the university's athletic hall of fame. He entered the FBI as a special agent in 1934. In December 1936, he was named acting head of the FBI's Washington Field Office; he was appointed special agent in charge the following May and served until March 1941. Hottel was re-appointed special agent in charge in February 1943 and served until 1951, when he took a position in the Identification Division. He retired in 1955. Hottel was married three times and had two sons. Following his FBI career, Hottel served as executive secretary of the Horseman's Benevolent Association. He died in June 1990.

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

The Will Smith Effect: UFOs And Hollywood By Mark Lankester

The connection between what we watch on our screens, and see in the skies.

In 1996 something strange happened in the UK. From out of nowhere our fair island was swarmed with reports of strange lights in the sky, mysterious craft and flying saucers. The Ministry Of Defence's UFO desk was inundated with almost six times as many sightings as the year before.

Was it an invasion? Was E.T. finally here? Well, no... it was Will Smith.

"Popular culture informs what we see in the sky, and then how we interpret it," says UFO expert Dr. David Clarke, "You can't help but absorb it."

"We've grown up with science fiction movies like 'Independence Day', and no one can divorce themselves from it. Not that people were seeing that one movie, and then going out to look for UFOs - It simply raised their awareness, and they became more likely to report things," he says.

David is a Sheffield based journalist, folklore expert, and official consultant to MOD's Classified UFO files at The National Archives. Think Fox Mulder with a South Yorkshire accent.

Roland Emmerich's alien-invasion spectacular 'Independence Day' was 1996's summer blockbuster and it sent the world extraterrestrial mad. "Newspapers even began running UFO campaigns," says David, "and the figures leapt from 117 sightings in 1995 to 609 in 1996"

"People would write in with sightings from decades before, encouraged to do so by the craze. It's the power of popular culture."

This phenomena of a film affecting UFO reports led to the coining of endearing term "The Will Smith Effect", but it's not all down to the Fresh Prince.

"The biggest spike was around 1977/8 - around the time we got 'Star Wars' and 'Close Encounters Of The Third Kind'," says David, "But there are also anomalies: 1982 for example, when 'E.T.' was released was a particularly quiet year."

"You couldn't look at it scientifically and say 'Right, this film is coming out =E2=80=93 therefore we should expect this many sightings'. It doesn't work like that. But by-and-large there is a strong relationship between aliens on screen, and UFOs in our skies.

"It's not mass hysteria, and it's not just movies - TV, books and comics contribute too - it's just a zeitgeist. When UFOs are popular, people see them."

To David, explaining UFO sightings is all down to trends:

"People's descriptions alter with time," he says. "In the 50s it was all flying saucers, and right now it's big black triangles. Largely influenced by Stealth aircraft sightings. That's then echoed in our media, and people largely begin to see only what it's popular to see."

There's two explanations for this, says David: "Either aliens are very fashion conscious and move with the times, or people interpret their experience through what's going on around them.

"Quite often we see what we believe, and not believe what we see."

A man dedicated to explaining the unexplainable, David doesn't stop with the crafts themselves - he says there's a problem with cinema's depiction of aliens too:

"The image of the little grey alien with the big black eyes seems to be endemic in our culture," he begins, "but there's lots of other types of 'aliens' that people see. There are reptilians, and even cat-people. But the interesting thing is how prevalent that one image is in the West. If you go to parts of South America, they tend to have very different 'aliens'. Their experiences are a mix of their own indigenous beliefs, and parts of Western cinema."

"Ever since H.G Well's early work, we've had this idea of the big-headed, big-eyed, tiny-bodied creature. Cinema picked it up, and it's never changed."

He summarises: "There's not a single story in the current UFO literature that hasn't been anticipated by science fiction, somewhere along the way."

To David, the very nature of the word "alien" shows the problem with how the movies do it: "The fact that we've evolved like we have, with a body, two arms, and a head, is an outcome of a billion different chance-like things. And the probability of those same chances occurring on a different planet, with a different set of rules and conditions, in another solar system:. It just wouldn't happen"

"The bottom line is, there's just too many extra-terrestrial experiences for them to all be true," says David. "In reality, in all of human history we might expect one single visit. If we're lucky. But in the absence of evidence, there are far more rational explanations in human belief, psychology, sociology, folklore and culture.

"I'm completely open to the prospect of life on other planets," he adds, "but the movies tell it a different way. And they change how we think about aliens. There are genuine experiences, but they tend to be so un-generic and weird, that they get forgotten. They just don't fit with the Hollywood ideal."

David, whose favourite movie is actually 'Close Encounters', has of course faced criticism for his seemingly skeptical approach, and even accusations of "government collaboration" -

but as he points out, even the movies that he singles out come under fire from conspiracy theorists:

"Some people genuinely believe that Hollywood is doing the bidding of the US Government," he says, "and that blockbuster sci-fi is actually a slow drip-feed of alien exposure, to get us all used to the idea:

"There's this great anecdote about President Ronald Regan, who was a great believer in UFOs himself. Regan invited Steven Spielberg to the White House for special screening of 'E.T.' =E2=80=93 then halfway through the movie, he turned to director and said: 'You'll never believe this Steven, but there are people in this room, who know that all the things in your movie are perfectly true:'"

Forgive me if I summarize your gists as i) Jim's conclusions from 20th Cent. sightings; ii) William's flagging-up of non-corporeal possibilities; and Albert's knowledge of earlier evidence.

Have to agree that Fermi was out of his depth, either not being aware of reports or choosing to ignore them. Looking at the evidence it seems to divide into qualitatively different groups:

Astronomical reports by scientists and other qualified observers up to the early 20th Cent. - i.e. before governments had the need and power to suppress them (maybe seen in the work of Charles Fort). I'm referring to reports of large - sometimes very large - physical "things" seen above the atmosphere, often passing in front of the Moon or Sun. They're reported factually and prosaically and seemed to obey the laws of physics as far as motion and appearance goes - although many clearly exceeded our own capabilities, even now.

Sightings below the atmosphere, again from ancient times onwards (also featured by Fort) of many different 'craft' - some huge. There's a tinge of 'strangeness' to many, with reports of 'impossible' movements and actions, 'instant' disappearances etc. A case can be made - and is by Vallee et al - that these appearances shift to fit the human pre-conceptions of the day, with mythological entities in the ancient past, complicated mechanical airships seen in the 1800's, and sleek futuristic saucers in the 20th Cent. Where the sightings are also of beings, again they seem to change to suit contemporary expectations - i.e. pantheonic types in ancient times, while more recently (like at Fatima) folk saw religious icons and personages.

Lastly there's a huge modern mess of 'weirdness' involving entities at close range - either humanoid or more or less 'alien monsters'. These often seem to disobey the laws of physics, materializing and disappearing, easily passing through walls,

barriers etc. They also seem to have psychic effects on witnesses, many reporting a 'life-changing experience' and in fact the event often seems to cause long-term mental and character change in witnesses.

I get the impression that folk 'choose to believe in' one of those groups and exclude or ignore the others. What if they're all more or less 'real' perceptions?

Fermi - although a gifted physicist, was necessarily a materialistic & deterministic thinker and, as far as these phenomena are concerned, would probably be even more out of his depth today.

This New Discovery Will Finally Allow Us To Build Biological Computers

The dawn of biological computers is at hand. In a major first for synthetic biology, Stanford engineers have used genetic material to create a biological transistor. Called the "transcriptor," the creation is the final, missing component necessary for the creation of a biological computer that could enable researchers to program functions into living cells.

Modern computers rely on three standard functions. One: they must be able to store information. Two: they have to be able to transmit information. Three: they need a basic system of logic =E2=80=93 a set of rules that governs how they should function given one or more forms of input. A biological computer would implement all three on a cellular level, using proteins and DNA in place of silicon chips.

The first two functions have been demonstrated with cellular materials before. Several labs have now demonstrated the ability to store digital data in DNA, some of them at jaw-dropping densities [link]; and last year, a team led by Stanford bioengineer Drew Endy developed a system for transmitting genetic information between cells. Now, in a study recounted in the latest issue of Science [link], Endy's team has developed what it calls a "transcriptor" =E2=80=93 the biological equivalent of a digital transistor =E2=80=93 and with it a system of logic that can control cellular function.

In your standard computer, transistors govern the flow of electricity by playing red light/green light with electrons along a circuit. Similarly, a transcriptor regulates the flow of a protein called RNA polymerase along a strand of DNA. Transistors and transcriptors are, at their most basic, on/off switches =E2=80=93 the gatekeepers of information transmission, storage, amplification, and so forth.

The rules that these gatekeepers follow give rise to the logic systems that dictate what problems a computer can solve. A transcriptor gatekeeper that lives by a code of "AND," for example, might allow RNA polymerase to continue along a strand of DNA when two predetermined conditions are "true" =E2=80=93 if, for example, the transcriptor detects the presence of Enzyme-A AND Enzyme-B inside the cell.

A transcriptor that abides by the code of "OR," on the other hand, would allow RNA polymerase to continue when either or both of the enzymes are present. In computer science, transistors that abide by AND-/NAND-/OR-/XOR-/NOR-/XNOR-rules (which you can read all about here) [link] are called Boolean logic gates. Endy calls his transcriptor equivalents Boolean Integrase Logic gates. Or "BIL" gates, for short [link]. Below, Endy provides an in-depth explanation of Transcriptors and BIL gates.

Here's the takeaway: if you line a bunch of these logic gates up, you form a logic circuit. Get enough logic circuits together, and you have a computer that can handle just about any computation you throw at it =E2=80=93 whether it's addition and subtraction on a calculator, or gene expression inside a cell.

Endy plans on starting small. For now, he's working with bacteria, helping other researchers use his BIL gates to engineer E. coli that can be programmed to change color. And in a refreshingly practical take on the potential applications of his team's creation, Endy told NPR's Morning Edition [link] that he doubts these DNA computers will ever outwit your iPhone; but this, he said, is missing the point.

"We're building computers that will operate in a place where your cellphone isn't going to work."

Chicago X-files: Center Studies UFOs by Ryan Smith

"A lot of people think we're this massive lab with these huge tentacles reaching out everywhere, but that's not really true. We're a fairly small enterprise," said Mark Rodeghier, CUFOS scientific director.

Indeed, "center" may not be as applicable of a word to describe the organization these days as "network". Though there are a handful of volunteers in the city, most of CUFOS' several hundred members are scientists and academics scattered throughout the world. And in 2010, difficult economic times forced the UFOlogists to close the doors of its longtime headquarters on Peterson Street in Chicago's northern Arcadia Terrace neighborhood. More than 70,000 case files, journals and scientific papers are now split between the Skokie home of the organization's archivist and the basement of Rodeghier's ultramodern house in Norwood Park.

Dispersed or not, CUFOS remains one of only two major organizations in the U.S. dedicated to the serious (yes, serious) academic and scientific study of UFO activity. Its primary focus is to be something of a think tank of unexplained phenomena--focusing on collecting and documenting information on reported sightings, producing reports and journals and assisting researchers around the world with their own investigations.

Columbia College professor Tony Trigilio made a recent visit to CUFOS to browse through the center's archives. The creative writing professor is working on a book of historical poetry about a UFO abduction case and found a file at CUFOS to be invaluable.

"I was doing a lot of research on people who claim to be abducted, and CUFOs kept coming up in the research I was doing," Trigilio said. "I wish knew about it before because it's such a great archive."

The last report of a sighting recorded by CUFOS was a claim about two months ago of a strange aircraft with orange lights flying over Chicago's northern suburbs, allegedly too close to the ground to be a plane.
